The signs that it was to be a great show were present long before our arrival in beautiful San Diego, given our foreknowledge of Danny Quast's receiving the Distinguished Service Award and Paul Voykin's nomination for Golf Week's 2003 Superintendent of the Year. Next on the agenda for MAGCS was a thorough whipping of the field in the Annual Golf Championship, highlighted by Tommy Robinson's stunning victory in the Championship Division A Flight, followed closely by Al Pondel, CGCS in second place. The team of Don Cross, Al Fierst, Bob Maibusch, CGCS, and Les Rutan took sixth place in the Net Point Division. On top of all this, we did pretty well in the Four-Ball Event, with Tommy Robinson and Al Pondel taking third in the 2-Man Gross; Steve VanAcker, CGCS and Brad Legnaioli grabbing seventh place in the Net; and Peter Leuzinger, CGCS and Miller McClintock winning first place in the 2-Man Net II division. And then, to put the icing on the cake, Chuck Anfield, CGCS and his partner won Golf Week's Super News Event. Fantastic job, and congratulations on a job well done to all of this year's competitors!

Once attention turned from the golf course to the conference, Midwest's run of good fortune did not end. At the Opening Session on Thursday the 12th, GCSAA President Jon Maddern, CGCS presented the Distinguished Service Award to the very-deserving Danny Quast, CGCS. Gordon Witteveen and Gordon LaFontaine were the other winners of the DSA, ensuring their place in history as the first time ever that two Gordons won in the same year.
