Mr. James will leave some very big shoes to fill, and the RISE board vows to find the right person for this important job. We at MAGCS wish Allen James all the best in his retirement.

Congratulations to James B. Hyler of Raleigh, NC on his nomination for presidency of the United States Golf Association (USGA) for 2010. The election of officers and the 15-member Executive Committee will take place on February 6th at the USGA's Annual Meeting in the Village of Pinehurst, NC.

Looks like the end is finally here for Methyl Bromide—EPA has demanded an immediate cancellation of its use on golf courses and has rejected a registrant proposal for a cancellation timetable to allow sufficient time for golf facilities

to adjust operations or implement alternatives. GCSAA is urging superintendents to contact their Congressional representatives to encourage EPA to accept the registrants' proposal for orderly cancellation.
