

As the first snow falls over our area this Saturday morning in early December most of us have our golf courses "put to bed" for the winter. And most are able to get some needed rest. I, on the other hand, am getting geared up for the snow season by working our city's first snow event.

I assist fellow MAGCS member Dan Anderson who is the Superintendent of Parks and responsible in helping the City of Aurora keep the roadways clear of ice and snow. I started helping Dan going back to the days of the economic downturn when there were layoffs, retirements without replacements, and asking to do more with less all started.

The City of Aurora is the second largest city in the state and takes a lot of coordination when it comes to snow removal. The city covers four counties (DuPage, Kane, Kendall, Will) and has to work with representatives in each in addition to IDOT and 7 other surrounding townships. The city is divided up into 37 snow plow routes. The Street Department has 20 routes, Water and Sewer has 7 routes, and the Parks Department has 10 routes. Each department is located in a different region of the city which makes the logistics a little easier as we are not crossing each other's paths or have long travel

times to our respective areas. During any given snow event the city's goal is to keep primary roads clear with all city streets plowed within 12



hours of the snow ending.

Each year salt usage can range from as a little as 9,000 tons as in 2015-16 season, to more than double like the 2013-14 season when we used 19,600 tons. The city's five-year average of salt usage is 12,780 tons. Salt contracts are secured in February prior to the subsequent snow season. These contracts require us to receive at least 80% of the ordered amount and can be increased to 120%-130% if needed depending on the vendor. The city has learned to have contracts with multiple vendors as securing salt deliveries when needed may be difficult. Many operations learned this lesson during the 2013-14 snow season when barges had trouble maneuvering up the frozen Mississippi River. This resulted in local non-contracted salt purchases at much higher prices if one was even lucky to find some.

The city has two salt storage facilities. Our traditional looking salt dome is located at the Central Garage facility in the center of the city. This site can store 3,500 tons of salt inside the dome and an additional 2,500 tons piled and tarped outside. The other salt storage facility is a newer building in the east region of the city near the Parks Department. It has been designed to look like a barn that blends into the surrounding residential landscape. This structure can hold 4,500 tons with an adjacent parking lot that can hold an additional 2,500 tons if needed. Between the two facilities we can store what we would use in a light year. What becomes difficult is accepting new salt deliveries that start arriving before we have a chance to use what we have stockpiled. We realize the need for a third salt facility in the west region for storage and operations on that side of the city. Determining salt orders 10 months in advance of a season is very difficult when considering: cost of the purchase, having enough supply, storage, and public safety.

Staffing for the snow season requires some schedule changes. The departments responsible for snow removal divide their

CDL drivers over three shifts from Thanksgiving to the middle of March. This provides 24 hour coverage Monday through Friday eliminating work week overtime during winter months. For weekend events, drivers are called in from maintained overtime lists. Non CDL employees are used to maintain sidewalks, parking lots, and cul-de-sacs with smaller trucks. My full-time golf course employee joins two parks department employees to form the weekday 3<sup>rd</sup> shift. It is also during this shift when all the golf course equipment maintenance is done. I have no staff at the golf course during the day only seeing the 3<sup>rd</sup> shift staff in passing when I arrive in the morning. In this short amount of time we discuss their coming tasks, direction, and what parts and supplies I can pick up or order from them during regular business hours. If I need assistance on the golf course during the day I can count on Dan

to coordinate someone from his staff to come over and help out.

We have enough personnel in our department to cover the removal of snow around the clock but not enough management to track and monitor progress during snow events. This is where I come into play and assist. Dan and I are responsible for monitoring the 10 routes of the Parks Department. We maintain three of the 10 routes with employees and the other 7 are contracted with four different vendors. Dan and I work together to make sure the department has supervision during an entire snow event. I typically cover after hour shifts because Dan still has davtime responsibilities and interactions with

other departments in the city. We also cover for each other when we take our much needed time off away from work. Tracking events consists of calling drivers on the 10 routes every hour to document their progress and discuss any issues before they lag too far behind. Each route is listed by primary roads followed by less travelled residential streets. This docu-

mentation enables us to provide those who monitor the whole city timely information.

Fielding complaints is part of the aftermath of any snow event. The City of Aurora has a customer service center which takes all of the residents' complaints. They enter the issues and information into the system which sends it to the appropriate department



for follow up. Complaints range from streets that have been missed, snow piled too high near an intersection, mailboxes damaged or buried, driveway damage to lawn damage. The Street Department handles all the mailbox damage; most of the complaints our department gets tends to be snow plow damage to lawns from errant plows. All complaints

> are verified, remedied at the time if possible, and closed out in the logging system. Items that have to be addressed later, like lawn damage, have to be noted in the system with a follow up date when the weather favors the application of seed and soil.

> Remarkably I still find time to get away and seek more snow in the U.P. of Michigan to snowmobile with fellow superintendents and friends. It takes some weather monitoring so I don't stick Dan with a snow event to handle by himself. It's hard to plan these trips and one has to be ready to go when there is snow to ride. In December, my getaway bag is always packed coupled with an understanding family, I'm usually able to have some fun on

the snow a couple of times each winter.





Now its lavish golf course is closed, having "outlived its usefulness" according to the owner (although others, citing its price tag of \$350 - \$500 a round, argue that Wynn epitomizes what is wrong with golf). Don't feel too sorry for Steve Wynn though—the property being vacated by the golf course will be used for a hotel addition, convention space expansion and a 20-acre lagoon with white sand beaches, zip lines, water skiing, boating and fireworks (does Epcot sound familiar?). So while

the golf course earned on average \$5 million a year, the new facilities are expected to earn 10, 20 or even 100 times that. Maybe Al Czervik was right—country clubs (and cemeteries) ARE the biggest wastes of prime real estate!



# Beaten by the Ugly Stick

### How We Solved our Practice Tee Problem

The battle lines were drawn many years ago. The once-forgotten place on the golf course, where a handful of golfers would hit a few shots to warm up before heading to the first tee—the Practice Tee—somehow became important.

Whether due to the modern family schedule not allowing enough time to play a round but enough to whack some balls, or the countless teaching resources that are readily available, promising lower scores by trying this tip or that club, practice facilities are getting more use, and many of us struggle with keeping them playable through the long season.

I consider myself as a pretty anal person, especially when it comes to our practice tee and its daily preparation. I am also guilty of falling into a rut, employing the same procedures day after day, season after season, expecting to see different results for no logical reason. THIS season, however, I had an epiphany—one which came from the oft-ignored voice of our Caddie Master, who asked the simple question, "Why not do it this way instead?" BAM! From that seemingly insignificant suggestion we tweaked our daily maintenance program ever so slightly, and the results were nothing short of fabulous.

Our issue over the past years was this: How do we provide playable turf by the time we cycle through the tee which measures 26,000 square feet, and takes 3 weeks for a rotation? In a perfect world we would be able to lightly irrigate the seedbed frequently, germinating in a few days and establishing a thick stand of grass in that time frame; but the world of practice tees is far from perfect. Watering during use is

frowned upon, and the hours of use are sunrise to sunset (and beyond, if the club is hosting a wedding and the range kid forgot to bring in the balls). Mid-July sun beats down on what scant seedlings have survived their initial days above ground, slapping them back down to where they began life. Golfers with bags full of picks and shovels and other implements

of destruction are conducting experiments daily to see how deep they can dig, as if they are planning to bury something that in 3 weeks they will seek to uncover anew. It just isn't easy being a range tee.

Over the years, we've promoted the "Concentrated Divot Pattern" approach, where golfers leave behind one big divot; then the "Scattered Divot Pattern," where they just hit from random spots between the dividers; to our current "Linear Divot Pattern," where we encourage our players to hit your next shot from just behind your last, leaving a "bacon strip" or two. And while I feel that this is the best method for quickest recovery, our problem did not go away. We were doing everything correctly that we could control, but we just couldn't figure out how to buy more time between rotations. Until one day last spring when Skip our faithful Caddie Master uttered these words: "Why not leave the rope?"

You see, each morning we would go about the process of moving the hitting stations back to unused grass, collecting the spent divots and debris, seeding and sanding the carnage, and wetting it down before players arrived. We'd use a rope stretched across the tee to make sure all the stations were lined up perfectly, then coil the rope and store it until the next day. By taking Skip's advice and leaving the rope stretched across the BACK side of the hitting stations, we put an end to

our biggest problem—that of golfers moving back into tomorrow's hitting area today, requiring us to move the stations further back each day than necessary. With that one little trick, along with setting up the ball pyramids at the front of the stations, we went from around 13 cycles through the tee in previous seasons to 2-1/2 this season.

#### Preserving our Range

#### Here is our formula:



1. Start by having all you'll need at hand—a Rubbermaid shed works great for us.



5. We keep a tote of the mix behind our tool shed on a pal-



6. Set up the hitting area for the day—for station dividers we use wooden 4x4's cut 4 feet long, taper-cut at both ends with two 12" spikes to stick them in the ground at approximately 10-12foot widths. We use a taut rope at the front of the stations to precisely set the dividers.



2. Rake or blow yesterday's divots into piles and remove them.



7. Set the rope across the back of the dividers and the balls in front to encourage "playing it forward," while discouraging using tomorrow's spot.

8. Placards reminding golfers how we prefer they utilize our tee are attached to each bag stand. 9. Rinse and repeat daily.



3. Hand-sow seed—we use Penncross coated with Apron, limestone, nitrogen and mycor-

rhizae.

4. Cover the seed with divot mix—ours comes from Redline and is 60% sand, 20% reed sedge or Dakota peat, and 20% Healthy Grow compost (they'll custom blend whatever you ask).

Last season our first complete rotation began on April 19th from the front of the tee and returned there on July 7th (about 11 weeks compared to 3-4 in past years). Our next full cycle lasted until September 19th, and we finished the season on November 1st about halfway through a third rotation. Having that much time allowed us to provide a near-perfect stand of turf every single day of the year. For the year we used 40 pounds of seed, 4 tons of divot mix, and approximately 2 man-hours each day. The tee was maintained the same as our other tees, with bi-weekly applications of fungicides, Primo PGR, and foliar nitrogen. We supplemented the foliar fertility with 3 applications of 12-24-12 granular in spring, summer and fall. Sure, it's just the range tee, but it is typically the first impression a golfer has when playing your course. The transformation we experienced by tweaking just a couple little things was noticed by everyone who uses our practice facility, and is a positive reflection on our care of the golf course.
