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POINSETTIA CARE

A Poinsettia plant received during the holidays can be kept in excellent condition, if you follow a few simple rules. Place the plant in a room, near a sunny window, where a constant temperature between 65 and 75 degrees is maintained. Avoid any chilling of the plant, as this will cause the leaves to become yellow and drop. Be sure to give your poinsettia plant an abundance of water while blooming. Dry air, fluctuations of temperature, gas and insufficient light affect them adversely.

With little care, your plant can be carried over to flower again next year. The plant should be watered normally until half the leaves have dropped; then, watering should be gradually reduced until the soil is completely dry. At this time, the plant must be placed in storage at a temperature of about 60° F.

About the middle of April or in May, cut the plant down to six inches, remove from the pot and repot in new soil, using a mixture of three parts loam, one part leaf mold, one part sand, and one and one-half parts well decomposed manure. Resume watering, and when the new shoots begin to develop, cut off all but one main shoot. When the weather is settled and warm, take the plant outdoors to a sunny location and set the pot in the soil up to the rim. Turn the pot every week or so, to keep the roots from growing into the soil beneath the pot.

In the fall when the temperature drops to 60 degrees, bring the plant indoors, keeping it on the back porch for several weeks before placing it in the living room; water it lightly until it has become accustomed to the indoor conditions.

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
