The President's Message

Turf Research is on the upswing in Illinois. Many of you were part of the Illinois Turfgrass Day (August 25th) at Indian Lakes Golf Club. The enthusiasm that was shown was outstanding. I guess when you have two fine people like Dr. Turgeon and the Dean of Agriculture, Orville Bently, who, by the way, took time out from his busy schedule to show up for the day, working for their cause becomes a little easier. The committee, headed by Roger LaRochelle, did a superior job of making arrangements for the day with everything running like clockwork. The weather even cooperated—in fact, it was a cool day, something we had little of this summer.

Many people get a little put off when asked to make contributions—not so this time. The generosity was phenomenal as shown by the numerous gifts given by clubs, the Chicago District Golf Association, and even by the distributors who so heartily dug into their pockets for donations. I feel a little discouraged, however, that we got such poor coverage from many of our local papers. Possibly they missed the importance of the day. Just as children become accustomed to receiving candy for no reason other than to keep them from crying, we should refrain from giving out an abundance of scholarships that would encourage people into a profession that is as demanding as ours. We need good people but giving too many of them a chance doesn't really get me excited.

Illinois has started a research fund that seems to be a step in the right direction. This shows some foresight in that we are looking after the interest of our clubs and the people of our state. Now the turf researchers must take over and give us some quality information and maybe something within a year, not twenty years down the line. The continued success and fine results of the program, I'm sure, will depend on continued enthusiasm by the researchers and ourselves.

The sympathy of the members of the Midwest Association of Golf Course Superintendents is extended to the entire Raymond Davis family due to the death of Ray. Raymond was a retired golf course superintendent formerly at Medinah C.C. and North Shore C.C. He supervised the building and maintenance work at Arlington Park Towers golf course. He also was a past president of the Midwest Association of Golf Course Superintendents, and a member of the golf course Superintendents Association. He passed away at the age of 71.

The sympathy of the members of the Midwest Association of Golf Course Superintendents is extended to the Al Purvey family of McHenry, III. Mr. Purvey passed away on August 24th, 1975. He was an AA member of the G.C.S.A.A. and of the M.A.G.C.S. Al was the golf course superintendent at McHenry Country Club for 48 years prior to his retirement 15 years ago. He was active at McHenry C.C. until the day of his death.

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A SEASON OF EXTREMES FOR 1975

In my opinion this year has been one of the toughest to keep grass. We had a super spring and all turf came out of the winter in excellent shape.

I don't know how many Superintendents keep track of the temperatures and rain fall during the year, but I do. I have a Taylor recording thermometer which records the temperature 24 hours per day for one week. I have had this machine for about 7-8 years and still have all those weekly charts.

This year from May 1st thru August 31 I have recorded at Glen Oak C.C. in Glen Ellyn 46 days of temperatures of 90° or above. No days of 100° of which we usually have 2-3 days per year in the past. There was one period from about July 15th thru August 12th where we only had five days where the temperature didn't hit 90° or above and all those days the temperatures were in the high eightys.

Temperatures and Rainfall breaks down below:

	Temperature	Rain'
June	9 days 90° +	2.68 for month
July	23 days 90° +	1.64 for month
August	14 days 90° +	5.78 for month (2.85" was on Aug. 30)
Totals:	46 days 90° +	10.10" Rain
