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The President's Message

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POSITION WANTED: GOLF COURSE SUPERINTEN-DENT or ASSISTANT. Age: 22, Single, four years experience on an 18 hole course. B.S. degree in turf from Hometown University.

How many of these ads have we all seen over the past years? Have you noticed how many you have seen just in the past year? If you have noticed, there has been a great increase in these "Position Wanted" ads. And all for a good reason. The enrollment of most of the "turf schools" has been up. More and more students have been coming out of these schools with a B.S. degree or with the two year certificate then ever before in our history. It seems too that every "Hometown University" has a curriculum in turf management. It is my opinion that we are getting an over abundance of personnel coming into the turf field WITH NO PLACE TO GO!

It isn't that we don't need or want these college trained students, we just don't need the vast numbers that are being flooded on the job market. We do need people trained in turf, we do need the young people coming from college trained in all the latest in turf research. We do need specialists in our field. But we don't need so many that once they graduate they become disillusioned when they can't find a job and then they go off into another field. That means that research and scholarship money has been wasted. In this day and age with many state grants being cut off to the schools and the little there is to go around makes this into a double waste when the student that the school turns out does not produce.

In the January 1976 issue of "The Golf Course Superintendent" in their "Turf Talk" article it goes on to say: "A random check of the 1968 GCSAA scholarship recipients would indicate that a good percentage do continue in the field. Forty-one scholarships were awarded in 1968. Today, 18 recipitants are active in the profession and are members of the GCSAA. Another is a turfgrass researcher. Seven of the 41 recipients were either sons or brothers of superintendents members of the GCSAA". In my opinion 46% is not a good percentage. I think something above 75% would be a good percentage.

In fields outside the turf industry the specialized schools start to cut back enrollment when the job market starts to dry up. I think that it is about time that our own turf schools should give a second look to what is happening once their students leave their campus. Just what is the percentage of students going into the

turf field? How many continue in what they were taught? How many go into unrelated jobs and waste all the research and scholarship money that is so hard to come by.




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
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


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THE MIDWEST CANDIDATE SPEAKS OUT!

To be part of a group of aggressive and progressivethinking superintendents that show interest and put forth many good ideas that challenge our National organization is indeed a pleasure. We (I say we because I have had your support almost 100 per cent for three years) have been "shot down" more than any other group because of our desire to express ourselves, not to merely drift with the tide.

The thought of not winning is certainly overshadowed by the **meaning** of running and expressing the views that are of importance. Some of these views

were:

 Our certification program is adequate but would carry much more meaning if the pesticide seminar was handled in conjunction with it, which, in turn, might be

valid for state pesticide licensing.

2.) The conference split-sessions divide everyone up so that only a limited number of people attend each session. With so many speakers, one becomes frustrated trying to decide which one to attend. The cost of bringing so many out-of-town speakers to the conference is quite enormous, as you can well imagine. Are we missing the point of having some of our best people give talks and also of leaving a little time for the equipment show and for turf talk with fellow superintendents?

3.) My concerns for our Golf Course Superintendent magazine were: the need for upgrading the binding used, the need for the use of more superintendent authors or related articles selling ourselves (public relations), and the possibility of discontinuing the use of conference talks in the magazine.

4.) The elimination of the Conference Proceedings, due in part to the multi-sessions, was unfortunate. To me, these are, or were, a very valuable part of our

education and Association history.

These, and many more ideas, were expressed, only to be branded at the time as "bombs" or aggravating accusations toward the Association.

-GCSAA Management Seminar in Chicago was put on with short notice and ends up short of people—just 4 attended, that's right, 4! Thanks to the new dues increase, we can easily afford blunders like this.

Questioning the dues increase was called ridiculous by some mesmerized people that never challenge our leaders. However, word has it that a quick tabulation was taken after the past National Conference, only to find that, in reality, we were in **sound** financial condition! These same people might deny the possibility that one of our top Association personnel will be leaving headquarters in the near future. Could there be more?

Gentlemen, when more people share our feelings, I'm sure some worthwhile goals will be in the offering and will, in return, be the best for all of us. To my many friends of the Midwest and other supporters—thanks.
