Check in next month to find out who toured a course in Nashville with only 32 putts.





Well, here it is December, another year almost gone. It's the time of year to start thinking of what we might do next year. One thing that helps our thoughts is the Turf Clinics and Conferences where we can see what other people did and what all the good Professors discovered this past season. It is also a time we can catch up on reading material that has accumulated through the summer.

There is something about most of these articles and conferences that bothers me. The majority of these articles and topics at clinics are geared toward private clubs. In most printed articles, whether it be USGA, GCSAA, CDGA, and even local association publications, it seems most are geared toward Green

Chairmen, House Chairmen and members.

Daily Fee and municipal courses encounter turf wise many of the same problems that private clubs do but there are many things totally different. One is that daily fee courses never have a day that the course is closed so that they may fertilize, spray or manicure without interruption. Another is the many company outings and tournament play which is very heavy through the warmest months. These are many times, golfers that play your course just once a year, and if you have a problem that is solved two days later, they do not understand it, and may not return.

Budgeting is also different in that if revenue is down expenses are also expected to be down because there

is no one to assess for excess expenses.

Considering the above, maybe in the future hopefully daily fee and municipal operations may get a little more consideration in some of these clinics and publications.





Sensible Management of Pests Is Theme
For Pesticide Clinics

URBANA--"Sensible Pest Management of Pests of Ornamentals, Turfgrass, and Non-crop Areas" is the theme for the 1977 Urban Pesticide Dealers and Applicators Clinics to be held during January in Illinois. The clinics are sponsored jointly by the University of Illinois Cooperative Extension Service; Illinois Natural History Survey; and the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Division of Plant Industries.

Topics discussed will be of primary interest to dealers or applicators who sell or apply home, yard, or garden pesticides. Custom applicators and operators who apply pesticides to nonagricultural areas such as parks, highways, golf courses, and similar areas should also attend the clinic.

Some of the topics to be discussed include: knowing what is pesticide safety; the most important pest problems of 1976 and some research results; pesticides available to dealers and applicators and recommendations for 1977; and the current status of federal and state pesticide acts.

There will be a special training session for those persons wanting to be licensed under the category, Industrial Weed Control. This session will cover the topic of non-crop weed control as commonly used

along highway right-of-way.

A representative of the Illinois State Department of Agriculture will administer examinations for custom spray applicator and operator licenses at the end of each clinic for those wishing to take the exam. The exams will be in the categories of industrial weed control and landscape and turf. Tests in other categories will also be available.

Commercial applicators who last took the examination prior to 1972 must take a new examination this

year to renew their license.

Additional information about the clinics may be obtained from any University of Illinois County Extension office or from Roscoe Randell; 164 Natural Resources Building, University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois 61801.

There will be a \$3.00 charge for a manual containing educational materials and information discussed at the clinics.

Because of the anticipated large enrollment, advance registration is required for the clinic at Rosemont. Dealers and applicators who plan to attend this clinic should contact Ferdinand Arndt, 1475 Oakwood, Des Plaines, Illinois 60016. Registration and meal charge for this meeting is \$13.

### Dear Ray:

The photo of the tractor and sand rake in the current Bull Sheet brought back old memories. I operated this type rake for my dad at the Evanston Golf Club and, coincidentially, used the same model tractor. The tractor is a Worthington, powered by a Ford Model B engine. The three section rake was controlled on the tractor by a steel cable which raised and lowered the rakes together. You will notice on the left side of the photo there is apparently a man holding a hand rake. In most cases, this was a two man job as we weren't able to get completely to the top of severely inclined traps and it was well to have an extra man along to finish up the high edges by hand. I do not recall the manufacturer of the rake. Hopefully, someone will be able to forward this information to you.

This photo was not taken at Evanston, as I do not recognize the operator and also the hub caps are slightly different. I compared this with old photos of


