

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Those of us who took advantage of the opportunity to work the booth at the Flower Show again came away with the satisfaction that can be achieved by helping someone in an effort to beautify his environment. This is also public relations at best. I would like to recommend that we elaborate on it and take it one step further.

I mentioned this at the board meeting back in January and all seemed interested. What we decided was to ask for volunteers to speak to garden clubs, homeowners associations and other interested groups on the subject we know best--"Lawn Maintenance". We would need to write a more or less basic speech to ensure a uniform presentation. The speaker should be from the area where the talk will be presented, and if possible, two speakers would share the podium.

It would be necessary to have a sign printed to display at the Flower Show with forms available to obtain the group's name, the address, time and location where the presentation would take place, as well as the name, address and phone number of the chairman of the group. It would be prudent to limit the appearances to the winter months, probably November through March. Basically, what it amounts to is a chance to showcase the talent that keeps popping up at the Fall Clinic. There is no shortage of speakers in the M.A.G.C.S.

If we were to start at the 1980 Flower Show we will have better than a year to write the speech and make all necessary refinements. I think it would be a worthy challenge and an opportunity to improve our public image. To ensure success we will need more than a few participants. It may seem a long way off, but if there is enough interest shown it would be feasible to start as soon as possible. Of course, if there is lack of interest or it becomes apparent that we cannot do it in a professional manner, it would be wise to postpone it until such time as it can be done right.

I would like at this time to thank Dr. Bill Daniels, Joe Grenko and, as always, Ben Warren, who again furnished the sod. And, of course, those members whose participation made it a success. Also, Albie Staudt for his assistance in dismantling the booth. It is a paradox of nature that the more you help another, the more you help yourself and in conversation with both the commercial people and the superintendents who contributed time at the booth, they have invariably commented on how much they enjoyed the discussion of the turf problems with the people who visited the booth. I think it can be the same if we implement a speaker program.

HERB GRAFFIS AWARD FOR 'GOLF FOR FUN'

NORTH PALM BEACH, FL., March -- Golf is basically a game and, as a perennial reminder of this, the National Golf Foundation has established the Herb Graffis Award to honor one of the game's most colorful and enterprising journalists. The award will go annually to the individual who, in the judgment of the selectors, has made a memorable contribution to golf as recreation, gold fellowship and health.

The new award will serve as a companion piece to the 8-year-old "Joe Graffis Award", honoring Herb's late brother, which recognizes an important contribution to

the advancement of education in the game.

In making the announcement of the new award, Don A. Rossi, Executive Director of the National Golf Foundation, said, "Herb was agreeable to the establishment of this award only on the condition that it should recognize that golf is a game and that it's important that it be played for fun, friendship and health. This was entirely in accord with our thinking in proposing the award because, in the pressure cooker of today's growing professionalism in sport, the ideal of sport for enjoyment tends to become lost.

"We hope the new Graffis Award will contribute in some small way to preserving the spirit of play," said

Rossi.

Graffis, elected two years ago to the World Golf Hall of Fame, has long been regarded as one of the game's most prolific and entertaining journalists. He and his brother founded the two most successful early golf publications, GOLFING (now GOLF magazine) and GOLFDOM, the game's first business journal. Now 85, Herb lives in retirement in Ft. Myers Beach, Fl., where he plays a nine-hole round two or three days a week "for the fun of it".

The National Golf Foundation itself was a creation 43 years ago of the Graffis brothers who urged its establishment by the manufacturers of golf equip-

ment.

The Foundation will solicit nominations for the new award, said Rossi, who added that the nominations will be evaluated by a jury to be named at a later date.

HOW TO REPAIR A BALL MARK

The Trouble With Ball Marks

The ball landed with a thud. The green was soft, and as the ball bounced forward it left a deep little crater in the turf, exposing brown earth at the back and grass blades pushed together at the front.

Ignoring the little crater, the golfer walked up to his ball, cleaned it, holed his putt and glowed with self-

satisfaction.

Some hours later, after the exposed earth in the ball mark had dried out, another golfer found the damaged area in his line of putt. He attempted repairs, but the result was not very satisfactory. An unflattened bit of turf twisted his putt off line.

Next morning an inexperienced greenkeeper mowed the putting surface without repairing ball marks. The result was a putting surface pocked-marked, untrue and covered with bare spots where the mower scalped the grass from the turf.

What Happens

What actually happens when a ball mark is not

promptly and properly repaired?

1. Soil is exposed, and so the area immediately surrounding the ball dries up faster than it would if the ball marks were repaired; and thus a blemish is left on the green.

2. There is a chance that the raised turf caused by

the ball will dry quickly and may die out.

3. The open soil invites weed invasion, such as crabgrass, silver crabgrass, POA ANNUA, dandelion, plantain, or Pearlwort ... seed of which could be brought in on the shoes of golfers, caddies or workers or on mowing equipment.

4. The improperly repaired or neglected ball marks leaves a bumpy spot in the green. If not corrected before cutting the next day, then the spot is scalped by the mower and the bruise mark remains for several days. This is especially noticeable in the Northeast during the summer season.

William H. Bengeyfield, Western Director of the

Green Section, says:

"From an agronomic viewpoint, a ball mark bruises the grass plant and severely damages or destroys the meristem or growing point. This means that turf recovery must take place from the perimeter of the damaged area, and this takes considerable time. Rapid drying of the damaged area is a major factor in delaying recovery. Some soil compaction also results from the ball's impact.'

How To Make Repairs

There is a correct way to repair a ball mark and, simply stated, it is to stretch the turf back over the bruised area, then loosen the soil beneath so that the bruised turf is able to root again.

To loosen the soil, some sharp-pointed instrument is required, such as a golf tee. The instrument must be sharp enough to penetrate the soil easily, and strong enough to cut through soil laterally at a depth of one inch or less.

In stretching the turf back over the ball mark area. try not to tear it loose. After the soil is loosened, the bruised and stretched turf must be firmed or pressed down to make contact with the soil again; otherwise, it may dry and die.

If a divot is taken when the ball hits the green and skids, the divot must be carefully stretched and replaced.





We all should start now to conserve water not only for the good of the grass plant but also for the good of the water supply we now have.

He certainly will be missed by his many friends in the turfgrass professional line of work.


