The C-15 strain of bent has been on golf greens for a considerable number of years and was always chosen as one of the better strains. Why should all of these problems pop up in this one season? I think more research work is necessary. There is no doubt that some changes have been made in the formulation of fungicides, insecticides and fertilizers. Some of these may create a problem to this Toronto strain. I am sure we all realize there are certain drugs that can be taken by certain people without any side effects. This could be one of the problems. Has there been a change in management practices? These are some of the things that should be investigated before we condemn a strain of bentgrass that has proven itself and continues to do so on many golf courses.

Ed Stewart, Supt. at River Forest G.C., reports a new automatic Toro irrigation system will be installed at River Forest G.C. in the spring of 1981. Just another happy Supt and well deserving. Ed also reports forty-four thousand rounds of golf were played at his course this past season. I wonder how many divots that represents.

Our M.A.G.C.S. annual meeting held at Cypress Inn on November 3 was not a well attended meeting. Members should show their interest in the operation of the association by attending meetings of this nature. HIGH TEMPERATURES IN NORTHERN ILLINOIS AND SOUTHERN WISCONSIN DURING THE SUMMER OF 1980

This summer (in terms of temperature) perhaps might be likened to the charcoals used in one of the famous American summer pastimes - the cookout; slow to get going, but too hot to handle once they do. The months of April, May and June were not particularly noteworthy for heat, but July and August were different stories. At MESOMET's Chicago Area Forecast Center, 35 East Wacker Drive, we have watched as the heat developed. The table below summarizes the number of days on which the high temperature reached or exceeded 90°, for selected weather stations in Northern Illinois and Southern Wisconsin. The climatological average is shown in parentheses. It reveals the period of July and August to indeed be a scorcher, particularly in Chicago itself, with the total number of 90° days through both months more than doubling the norm.

The excessive heat through the middle and latter part of July, which also included two 100 degree days in Chicago (a situation not witnessed for at least 15 years) was perhaps worse than the August heat from the maintenance standpoint, since the heat was accompanied by dryness (only a little over one inch of rain fell at O'Hare Field through 18 July - the normal for the entire month being about three times that amount). August at least stopped the drought before things got out of hand ... by promptly unloading 8.54 inches of rain at O'Hare Field, more than three times the climatological norm for the month.





The Illinois Department of Agriculture now requires that persons needing to renew a license (or get a new one) must pass a General Standards Exam before taking the applicator exam in any category.

We will hold two programs this winter so that you will be able to get the license you need.

DECEMBER 4, 1980 - CORE EXAM

The first will be held at the Botanic Gardens,

Glencoe. It will be only for those needing the Core Exam (General Standards Exam).

The exam will be given twice that day, first at 8:30

Following the exam there will be a training session covering all the material in the exam, for those who feel they have done poorly.

At about 2 P.M. the same exam will be repeated. Cost will be \$6.00 per person including lunch. JANUARY 19-20, 1981 - PESTICIDE CLINIC

The 1981 Pesticide Dealers and Applicators Clinic will be held January 19 and repeated January 20 at the Botanic Gardens. This will be a training school in both General Standards, and in Categories such as Landscape, Right of Way, etc., followed by core and category exams.


