If you retire at age 62, your basic benefit will be reduced to make up the extra three years of payments. At age 62, your reduced benefit will be 30 percent of the age 65 rate, but the closer to age 65 you retire, the smaller the reduction.

The reduction in benefits is permanent, but several other factors can raise or lower the actual payments you will receive. For example, you will be entitled to cost-of-living and other general increases. If you return to work before age 65, you will lose some benefits while you are working, but your benefit check the month you turn 65 will be higher because you received fewer payments before 65 than originally anticipated. If you work anytime after retirement and earn enough to increase your lifetime average earnings, your benefits also will increase.

While you may work and still collect social security payments, you are limited in the amount you may earn without forfeiting some portion of your benefits. However, at age 72, you will receive your full monthly check no matter how much you earn. Only earned income, earnings from a job or self-employment, is counted, not investment income, moving expenses, sick pay or standby par.

Arranging your retirement to collect maximum benefits is a complicated matter which requires a great deal of planning. Be sure you get adequate advice from a professional in this field before you take the big step. It could pay additional dividends in the years to come.



GOLF SUPERS HELP JUNIOR PROGRAM

The meeting of the Palmetto Golf Course Superintendents Association (PGCSA) held Tuesday at Skyway Golf Club was highlighted by the Association's giving a \$200 donation for the Myrtle Beach Area Junior Golf Program now underway here. Another feature was the visit of **Michael Bavier**, national vice president of Golf Course Superintendents Association of America (GCSAA).

Then in introducing Bavier, Dembnicki gave an interesting history of the speaker's background and his excellent work as a previous Director, which earned him the vice presidency. Bavier is the course superintendent at Inverness Country Club in Palatine, IL, which is in the Chicago area.

Bavier's opening remarks concerned Southern hospitality. "It's everything they say it is," he remarked, "I appreciate the hospitality, everyone is so great." Concerning the meal, Bavier said, "It's my first taste of chicken bog, and even though I took a good helping, I returned for another plate, and it was bigger than the first time."

He thanked the PGCSA for the invitation to come here, and for being picked up at the airport. "They drove me around the area and showed me some of the golf courses," he recalled, "you sure have a lot, it seems there is one every place you turn, I just couldn't believe the large number."

Bavier mentioned that he became curious about the Grant Strand a couple of weeks ago when Melvin Lucas, the national president of the golf course superintendents returned from Myrtle Beach after visiting the place during the Golf Writers Association of America's 27th annual weekend at the Dunes Golf & Beach Club in early April.

He praised The Sun News for its excellent coverage of the golf doings on the Strand. "You folks are fortunate to have a newspaper keeping you so well informed about this great game of golf," he stated, then added, "the folks who publish The Sun News should be congratulated, and their interest adds greatly to the growth of golf in this area."

Bavier stressed the importance of superintendents and efficient crews in being the main reason for the good courses in the Carolinas. In praising the workers, Bavier said, "Our achievements have shown the world what good work has meant in providing fine playing conditions, it has made course crews stand out."

The national vice president advised the PGCSA members to attend work seminars and other classes to advance in their profession. "Be able to speak, and be glad to do so when asked to address garden clubs and the like, your experience would be helpful," he explained.

He said he was glad to know the area is helping the young boys and girls with an active junior program. He was also pleased to know what an active golf program for and by the women of the area.

The bright stars of the lawngrass world range from aggressive ''takeover-artists'' to companionable beauties of pure elegance. Fylking Kentucky bluegrass belongs with the latter. Fylking won't overwhelm sister bluegrasses such as Glade in blends, and certainly not companion species such as Citation perennial ryegrass in mixtures. But it will add a touch of class to almost any lawngrass assemblage, for in sheer beauty Fylking is indeed stunning.

Observations all over the country prove that Fylking is unusually well adapted to a mowing height rather low for a bluegrass, - as little as a half inch (although we would prefer an inch high or taller). Research at Pennsylvania State University noted that Fylking was one of the few bluegrass cultivars in which the leaf angle is little affected by mowing height; rather the leaf remains low even when the grass is clipped short. Here's reason enough for wanting Fylking to be represented in your lawn!

Fylking is tolerant of other grasses, - not ''pushy'' nor aggressive - and lives companionably with its kindred. Yet it is broadly suited to a wide range of conditions. For example, east coast USDA tests show it to be among the most tolerant of bluegrasses to soil acidity, and in California it has endured alkalinity-salinity better than any other bluegrass cultivar. Fylking would certainly seem a first-rate candidate for lawnseed blends and mixtures used nationwide!

Of course, Fylking is favored with its fair share of those graces anticipated for any topflight bluegrass these days, - trueness to type, ability to spread well by rhizomes, rich color, delicate texture, reasonable tolerance to diseases. And no bluegrass seed of better quality can be had, - excellent purity devoid of serious weeds, top germination, robust field-cured seeds with great seedling vigor, and so on. Moreover, seed is readily available through leading suppliers in all parts of the country.
