

#### EDITORIAL

DISASTER - "D" stands for the disease which seemed to be present throughout this year. "I" stands for instantly, which best describes how fast the Poa seemed to die during the hot, dry weather of July. "S" stands for the storms which swept through many parts of central Illinois in early July, uprooting large trees and causing extensive damage. "A" stands for Ataenius which appeared this summer to further compound everyone's problems. "S" stands for the 6" of snow which hit central Illinois in mid-April and was the "kickoff" for such a memorable season. "T" stands for the constant high temperatures which characterized this summer. "E" stands for the evaluation which many of us will be making in reference to our maintenance programs as crabgrass control, disease prevention, irrigation, etc. Lastly, "R" stands for the rest which all golf course supts. now need after this testing summer.

Disaster would be an adequate description for the summer of 1980. This issue of the Newsletter was supposed to contain articles describing the floods which hit the southern California courses in February; the heat wave in Oklahoma and the tornadoes in Baltimore and their effects on the courses in those regions. However, I did not receive replies from the superintendents which I contacted in those areas. One reply, which I did receive, was from Dick Malpass, GCGC describing the effect the volcano (Mt. St. Helens) had on the courses in the Northwest. Dick, a past president of the GCSAA, wrote a very interesting article on the subject. I certainly appreciate his article and thank him for it.

Rich Hoadley, superintendent of Kaufman Park G.C., Eureka, IL also wrote a very good article on the flood damage to his course in June. This was Rich's first year at Kaufman Park, and with the floods in June and the hot summer, it was not an easy first season for him. However, Rich did an excellent job and his hard work is showing up on the course.

As bad as this summer has been, it has accomplished



one thing for us. It has opened many golfer's eyes to the realization that improvements must be constantly made to a golf course in order to keep it in good shape. Now is the time for the golf course superintendent to sell a renovation program or to stress a long range planning program for his course. It is the perfect opportunity for us to exhibit our salesmenship abilities. Also, it is an excellent educational opportunity for us to organize our CIGCSA January meeting on the subject of renovation. As Marvin said in his President's Message, a lot of grass was lost this past summer. What is everyone doing to renovate their courses so that a repeat of this past summer will not happen again? Hopefully, the Board can organize the January meeting so that we will have speakers, certain subjects to discuss, and a coherent, educational program. Let's not have one of those "everyone bring your slides and show them" type meetings. I know that I would certainly appreciate the opportunity to see what other superintendents in the area did to improve their course's conditions after this summer.







#### MOWER SAFETY

• When starting the engine, stand away from the mower and make sure the blade cannot make contact with your feet.

• Push the "walk behind" mowers across slopes, not up and down. This will keep the mower from sliding back into your feet and will keep you from slipping and falling into the mower. But if you use a "riding" mower, go up and down slopes for better stability.

· Do not mow wet grass because it causes clogging.

• When unclogging the discharge chute, make sure the engine is off. Disconnect the spark plug wire to prevent the motor from accidently starting.

• If your power mower does not have a grass-catching bag, make sure it has a deflector plate to direct the discharge toward the ground.

• Keep an eye out for children, especially when you are making turns or putting a riding mower in reverse.

· Do not carry passengers.

• Before starting a riding mower, shift into neutral to keep the machine from "lurching."

• Avoid walking in front of the discharge chute. It may turn out to be as dangerous as strolling through a firing range.

• Even if you leave your mower for a moment, stop the engine. Curious children may investigate the machine while you're gone.

#### PREPARING THE HOME ORCHARD FOR WINTER

You can help prevent damage to your fruit trees by preparing them for winter, says James A. Fizzell, Horticulturist with the University of Illinois in Cook County.

Mow all grass and weeds around the trunks of the trees. Use hand clippers on vegetation you cannot cut with a lawn mower. Be sure not to nick the bark. Unmowed vegetation provides cover for field mice which eat the inner bark of trunks and roots, frequently killing fruit trees.

Rabbits eat the bark off the trunk and any branches within reach, particularly on young fruit trees. However, Fizzell notes, they do not bother older trees which have developed heavy outer bark. Mechanical barriers are recommended for protection from rabbits. Use chicken wire or hardware cloth to form a cylinder around the trunk. The cylinder should be at least 2 inches from the trunk, and high enough to provide protection in the event of heavy snow cover. Or, wrap the trunk with newspapers, waterproof paper, or tree wrap.

Wrapping the trunk will also help protect the trunk from winter sun scald, says Fizzell, and will benefit even older trees not subject to rabbit damage. Trunk wrapping does not keep the trunk warmer, but provides shade from the winter sun which could elevate the temperatures of the inner bark to the point where it begins growing even in mid-winter. When the sun sets, temperatures rapidly drop to freezing or lower; this causes ice crystals to form in the inner bark, killing it. Such injury usually occurs on the south or southwest side of the trunk, the area most likely to be warmed by winter sunlight, and may not become apparent until the next summer. Some nurseries are investigating white paint on the trunk as a protection from winter sun damage.

Remove paper wrappings when growth starts in the spring as these wrappings provide cover for insects which may injure the trunk during the growing season.

Of major concern in winter survival of fruit trees is drainage, says Fizzell. Fill low areas so water will not stand around the tree trunks and roots during the winter months. Such conditions are ideal for development of disease organisms which could attack the trees at the soil line and kill them.
