Riverside Golf Club is renovating fairways. To date Roundup has been applied to ten fairways and then seeded with Penn Eagle. Next year five more fairways will be renovated using the same method. The renovated fairways are being mowed with Tri-Plex Turf Pro 84 mowers. Some construction work being completed around the club include three semi-truck loads of railroad ties being installed, work of resodding areas around no. 4 greens, and the reconstruction of deteriorated traps have all been important projects during 1983. Roger Stewart has been Golf Course Superintendent at the club for the past five years. In Roger's spare time he is an instructor at Triton College in River Grove where he teaches Lawn and Turf for the Horticultural Department. Riverside Golf Club was founded in 1893.

A friendly and cordial membership who wants excellence in turf is the atmosphere that exists at the Glenview Club says Bruce Sering, Golf Course Superintendent. The club was founded on March 29, 1897 under the name of Glenview Golf and Polo Club. Bruce is the fourth superintendent and has been with the club for the past 12 years. Some of his accomplishments which he has seen completed include installation of an automatic watering system, a new maintenance building, rebuilding every tee, recontouring of fairways, removal of ten traps and construction of three others, rebuilt and drained the driving range and complete relandscaping of the clubhouse areas. This past month he has been very busy rebuilding two tees, relocating two fairway traps, and recontouring of some of the rough areas for better drainage. This construction included the installation of approximately 5,000 sq. yds. of Bluegrass and Bentgrass sod. The fairways have been aerified with Greensaires for the past four years. At present these fairways are mowed with GM3 greens mowers at a height of 1/2". It takes approximately seven machines in operation and a total of four hours to cut these fairways one time. Bruce states that with fairway management riding greens mowers, no fertilizing, and a strong fungicide program equals membership happiness.

The second oldest Stag Golf Club in the United States is right here in our Chicagoland area. This being the Old Elm Club which was founded in 1911. Ed Fischer has been superintendent for three years and is the sixth superintendent in the history of the club to maintain its golf course. The play on the course usually averages around 7,000 rounds a year leaving it rough for Ed to get his maintenance completed during the early morning hours. This fall, drainage work is being completed in some of the low areas to eliminate some spring wetness. Also a tree planting program is under way in order to give some direction along fairways and to block off some open areas.

#### **GROWING IN 1983**

As we approach the end of a difficult growing season I would like to reflect on an area of the golf industry that experienced steady and unhindered growth despite the weather. #### **CURE POISON IVY**

Many old wives' tales have some truth to them. However, when it comes to poison ivy, most old wives' tales are just that — tales. For example, the rash, caused by direct or indirect contact with poison ivy, does not spread when the blisters of the rash are broken. The resin from the plant is in the skin, not in the blisters. New blisters are caused from the original contact with the poison ivy rather than from liquid in blisters. Washing within a few minutes after contact with the plant may help reduce the reaction, but the resin fixes very quickly to the skin and after about 5 to 10 minutes, washing really has no effect on the reaction.

Some people have tried to desensitize themselves or develop immunity to poison ivy by eating the leaves of the plant. All that will achieve is a bad case of poison ivy in the mouth and throat. A serious side effect to desensitization by this method could be that the mucous membranes in the throat swell and suffocate the experimenter.

Contact with the smoke from burning plants may also cause an allergic skin reaction in people who are highly sensitive and a rash of the eyes. The rash itself on the eyes may not cause damage; however, the resulting scratching may. The eye tissue is very sensitive, and constant rubbing and scratching could damage that tissue. Touching contaminated clothing or petting an animal with the resin on it may often result in a reaction. If your job or hobbies don't prevent you from contact, wearing clothing that covers exposed parts of the body does offer a defense. Once a rash has developed, cool water compresses are the best treatment because they help dry up blisters quickly. For mild cases, steriod salves that contain one-half percent hydrocortisone are recommended. If a poison ivy rash covers a large part of the body, seek medical attention. #### NINE WAYS TO NEGOTIATE A RAISE

Many people who have no trouble dealing with their superiors in most day-to-day situations find it very difficult to ask for a raise. If your fainthearted at negotiation time, consider these recommendations to ease the process:

- Know your worth. Ask yourself how valuable you are to the course, how much would it cost to replace you, what have you done lately to help the organization.
- Pick your place. Get your boss outside of the office to listen to your request. Take him to lunch if possible.
- Detail your reasons. Tell your boss why you deserve a raise.
- Suggest an amount. You, not your boss, should propose the amount of your possible raise.
- Set your figures high. Ask for more than you expect to get. This leaves room for bargain.
- Compromise but not too easily. Since you've started with a high figure, realize you probably won't get it. Let your boss make a counter-offer, and be ready to compromise.
- Rehearse. Don't go into regotiation cold. Be sure to be in top mental and physical condition when the actual talks begin.
- Get it in writing. If possible, get your boss to put it in writing — for both signatures — the raise he agrees to.
- Don't wait ask. Don't wait around for the company to recognize your value and give you a raise. Ask for it. Your aggressiveness may pay off.
