moan each year about the lack of texture on the greens, snow mold on the fairways, and rough up to your knees. Generally, these complaints derive from the player's failure to sink a threefooter, hit a fairway wood from a genuine lie, or an iron shot askew into the spinach.

Why don't you folks appreciate the work that greenkeeping superintendents do, not only in the season proper, but out of it, too? What doth a smart golf course superintendent do these days? Let Gerber take the stand:

"You've got to do a lot of forward thinking about keeping up a golf course", Ray says. "Especially in the fall and yes, even during the winter. Some folks think you just go out and mow the fairways, touch up the greens, and your job is done. A real greenkeeping superintendent can't be had cheap, if he's going to do the job right.

"I got my own start as a kid, driving a team of horses up at the old Woodhill club in Minneapolis. I was 15 then. Nobody had even thought up some of the mechanical contrivances we have today. If they mowed the fairways once in a week those days, it was good. The rough grew so high that it was seldom cut until the haying season, and the stuff was fed to the horses. It got so steep that a lot of the old timers who hooked or sliced a shot would actually roll into the high grass to find the ball by hitting it with their backs or chests. Ask Chick Evans or Jock Hutchison, Sr. They did it. And the greens were hand mowed, with an old job just like your pop used to wheel around on the front lawn. Man, how lucky golfers are now!

Our first job at this time of year is to spray the whole place with a special solution designed to eliminate clover and broad leaves. Our toughest job, and I guess it's one of the real tricks in sports, is to anticipate the first snow fall. If you can guess that one, you'll have the name of the game. Idea then is to treat your greens and fairway fronts to beat winter kill and snow mold. Winter kill comes from thawing, freezing, and standing water in low spots. Snow mold is a fungus condition originating in the soil.

This goes on all thru the months when most folks don't play golf in these parts. I can't say enough about last winter, when the January snow fell on unfrozen ground. As soon as that thawed, we went back to work again and treated the fairways and greens with a hand spreader, using dry material instead of the liquid solution we would use to spray during better weather.

"This sounds simple, but other off-season jobs include treetrimming, leaf-gathering, painting birdhouses and fences, draining the swimming pool, catch basins, plumbing of all sorts, screening the compost for next spring's top dressing. Shucks, I could go on and on. But I've been doing it at Glen Oak for 17 years, for a grand bunch of people, and I love it!"

#### **Old Tom Morris Award to President Ford**

Former President of the United States Gerald R. Ford will receive the Old Tom Morris Award from the Golf Course Superintendents Assoc-Association of America (GCSAA). Ford is the 1985 recipient of this significant international award that is identified throughout the golfing world with the true heritage and traditional founding of the game.

"The award is pre-



sented to an individual who, through a continuing, selfless commitment to the game of golf, has helped to further the welfare of the game with the same dedication and zeal demonstrated by Old Tom Morris,'' said James W. Timmerman, CGCS, President of GCSAA.

Ford brought international attention to this popular leisure time activity while serving as President of the United States. His golf outings have been portrayed both positively and frequently by the press. Ford is renowned as a man of integrity, and his association with the game of golf only results in further enhancing golf's attributes of honor and sportsmanship in the eyes of the world.

During his term in the White House, he clearly expressed his love for golf and his respect for the golf course superintendent. In a 1976 letter to GCSAA, President Ford explained, "Countless numbers of Americans derive pleasure, relaxation and exercise on our nation's golf courses. Evidence of the sport's growing popularity is seen from the increasing numbers who play it, from the rising sales of golf equipment, and from the media attention given to its major events. Holding a fascination for players of all levels and every social background, golf has become an important part of our national life.

"Much of the credit for this goes to you whose dedication and concern for perfection have made our courses into beautiful and reliable playing areas. The imagination and energy you bring to your tasks assure our nation's golf enthusiasts of the world's finest courses."

Since leaving office, Ford has continued to bring international attention to golf through his participation in charitable golfing events, as well as sponsoring his own charitable golf tournament, the Jerry Ford Invitational Golf Tournament.

"President Ford was selected for this award because he exemplifies some of the same characteristics that Old Tom demonstrated throughout his life. Ford's love for the game of golf is known around the world. Mr. Ford, like Old Tom, is a gentleman first, a gentleman last," said President Timmerman.

Old Tom Morris, one of golf's first greats, was a greenkeeper, golf professional, club and ball maker, golf course architect and accomplished player who won four British Open Championships between 1861 and 1867. At the Royal and Ancient, St. Andrews, Scotland, Old Tom acquired worldwide fame, boosting the popularity of golf throughout the British Isles and in many other parts of the world.

President Ford will accept the Old Tom Morris Award during GCSAA's 56th International Golf Course Conference and Show in Washington, D.C., February 5-13, 1985. The presentation will be made at GCSAA's annual banquet the evening of February 12th at the Sheraton Washington Hotel. An international golf audience and representatives of every major golf association will be on hand for the banquet ceremonies. The banquet attendance is expected to reach 2,000. Country and western singer Tanya Tucker will be the evening's featured entertainment.

#### MAGCS Survey

The survey conducted by the MAGCS is now completed and the results are being sent to those members who participated. We received a greater number of responses than ever anticipated. Our thanks to those individuals who shared their information with their peers and we hope the results you receive will benefit you in the performance of your job.

Each questionnaire was grouped by location (North, South, & West) and divided into three sub-groups which consisted of (1) Equity owned private clubs, (2) Resort and public courses privately owned and (3) Municipal, park district, or forest preserve (county).

#### **Responses - Total (65)**

Group #1 (38) — North-18, West-8, South-12; Group #2 (13) — North-3, West-4, South-6; Group #3 (14) — North-6, West-8, South-0.

In Group #1 North the average Superintendent's income was \$40,922.22. Income was based upon salary and bonus. In the case where a house is provided we assign a value of \$10,000 to that individual's income. The low end of the range was \$14,000 and the high end of the range was \$58,000. In Group #1 West the average income for Superintendents was \$41,606.25 with a range between \$26,000 and \$47,000. In Group #1 South the average Superintendent's income was \$35,712.50 with a range of \$22,000 to \$46,000.

In Group #2 North the average Superintendent's income was \$26,700 with a range between \$24,000 and \$29,000. In Group #2 West the average Superintendent's income was \$32,970 with a range of \$23,000 to \$44,750. In Group #2 South the average Superintendent's income was \$34,683.33 with a range of \$21,500 to \$45,000.

In Group #3 North the average Superintendent's income was \$24,942 with a range of \$17,300 to \$29,100. In Group #3 West the average Supt's. income was \$27,212.25 with a range of \$18,500 to \$39,000.

In upcoming issues of the **Bull Sheet** we will cover some of the other questions giving averages and ranges of the responses. Once again, our thanks to all those who participated.
