Pat Klein — Golf Course Superintendent at Hillcrest Club from March 1983 until his death on February 21, 1987. Pat is survived by his wife Sue, Matthew, age 4 and Sarah age 2. Other survivors include his mother Mary Spartz, stepfather Vernon Spartz, two sisters Marge and Laura Klein and a brother John.

Pat's love for golf course work began when he was a youngster of 12. He started working on Little Crow Country Club as a crew member in his hometown of Spicer, Minnesota. He worked his way up the ladder of responsibility to become, as a teenager, the Assistant Superintendent of Little Crow. Pat attended Michigan State University's Turf Grass Management Program starting in the Fall of 1977. He began working at the Glen View Club, Golf, Illinois in March 1978 as a student intern. Following his graduation in 1979 he returned to Glen View Club as Assistant Superintendent and remained there until becoming Superintendent at Hillcrest in March 1983.

These are the facts of Pat's life, but those who worked with him and were privileged to know him, realize there is so much more to say about him. His integrity and honesty were above reproach, no mean feat in today's world.

Pat loved his family and did not neglect them even though the demands of being a superintendent always beckoned him. It was a familiar sight for the members and neighbors at Hillcrest to see Pat, Sue, Matt and Sarah on a golf cart touring the Club in the evening.

Pat believed in God. His faith, his love for his family and his courage in facing the cancerous brain tumor were an example for us all. Pat learned about his condition about 2 years ago. Instead of withdrawing from life, he faced it fearlessly. Enduring radiation treatments and chemotherapy, he never complained or said, "Why me Lord?". Pat's quality of life for the past two years was good. He worked everyday, took his family on vacations, and kept his spirits on a high plane. Near the end when the debilitating effects of his brain tumor began to take hold, I asked Pat, "How it's going". What he said to me sums up the way Pat Klein approached life. He was lying in his family room, paralyzed, his eyes could not focus, and he could just barely hear out of his right ear. He said, "Well, it's a little tough now, being winter and all, but come the spring, I'll be able to get around better, and it'll be better." Pat stopped breathing early on the morning of February 21, 1987 with his mother, Mary and his wife, Sue by his side.



Leaves of Grass

Every individual plant of Kentucky bluegrass produces three feet of leaf growth in an average season. This growth amounts to about five tons of clippings per acre each year. When these clippings are left to decay in place, they are worth the equivalent of three applications of lawn fertilizer. The average lawn in the United States requires some 40 hours of mowing each year. Larger lawns are likely to require more than this and gardeners with smaller lawns, get away with less time at the mower. How often should a lawn be mowed? As far as lawngrasses are concerned, not more than 1/3 of the total growth above the soil should be removed in clipping at any time. Thus, a turf maintained at a 2 inch height could grow to a 3 inch height before mowing. A lawn maintained at a height of 1 inch could grow to a 1 1/2 inch height before mowing. At these frequencies, clippings need not be removed; they will decompose and help nourish the lawn.

Nitrogen Fertilizer Use by Lawngrasses

At any given time, lawngrasses can use only about one pound of actual available nitrogen per 1000 square feet. This is not very much. For **quickly** available sources of nitrogen, an application of 10 pounds of fertilizer containing 10 percent nitrogen, will supply this amount. For **slowly** available sources of nitrogen, an application of 10 pounds of fertilizer containing 30 percent nitrogen will supply 3 pounds of nitrogen. The larger amount of nitrogen, only part of which is immediately available, will last longer without over-stimulation of lawngrasses.

The Black Layer Problem on Greens

There have been an increasing number of reports from golf courses around the State of a black layer which forms below the soil surface on greens. In a worst case, those areas which develop a black layer can suffer significant turf loss. The turf research group at MSU has observed the problem on many golf courses and are beginning several research projects to determine more about the cause and cure for this problem.

At the present time, we have formed the following hypothesis on the development of the black layer. We are certain that the black layer is in an anaerobic state (no oxygen present - waterlogged) and this waterlogged condition is responsible for loss of turf. An anaerobic condition can develop whenever the ground becomes saturated with water which displaces the oxygen in the soil and prevents normal gas exchange with the atmosphere. In many greens which are constructed according to the USGA greens mix and are predominantly sand, the formation of an anaerobic condition may seem contradictory because sandy soils normally have excellent drainage. However, where layers develop in a soil profile, these layers retard downward water movement and under certain conditions anaerobic areas may form.

It is our belief that the black layer forms when a layering problem causes an anaerobic condition following heavy rains or irrigation. Under anaerobic conditions an entirely different group of microorganisms become active. These organisms produce products quite different from anaerobic respiration. Gasses produced under anaerobic conditions include carbon monoxide (CO), methane (CH4), ammonia (NH3) and hydrogen sulfide (H2S). Many of these anaerobic respiration products are toxic to plants. In particular H2S is the poisonous gas responsible for the deaths of over 1,500 people in Cameroon recently. The hydrogen sulfide produce by anaerobic organisms can react with metal ions such as iron or copper to form insoluble black precipitates. These metal sulfides are probably responsible for the color of the black layer. Indeed, the Black Sea derives

1001 Craig Road St. Louis, Missouri 63146 its name from the production of vast quantities of these black metal sulfides. The precipitated materials seem to enhance the layering problem and thus once the black layer is formed it is very difficult to dry out.

What to Do

It is clear from our observations that once the black layer forms, it is difficult to destroy. Prevention of the formation of the black layer is therefore very desirable. Attempts should be made to alleviate or prevent the formation of any layers in the soil profile. Core cultivation is the best method to disrupt layers and improve downward water movement. Topdressing programs should be done correctly to prevent layering. Watering should be restricted to syringing to help dry out the black layer. In addition, because roots are usually killed by the gasses released in the black layer, the root system is so shallow that syringing is needed to maintain the turf. Our current research is aimed at developing treatments to disrupt the black layer and improve drainage. Wetting agents should be helpful in preventing the black layer from forming by improving water percolation. However once the black layer forms, wetting agents would be of limited benefit.

We stress that the above explanation is only a hypothesis, but one we feel describes the current problem. Research is underway to prove or disprove this hypothesis.

"Immigration Facts"

Immigration Service has announced that they will be coming forth with verification law forms. At present all that is necessary for having new employees is to obtain the documentation that I will list below. However, once the forms are available, employers would have to conduct retrospective verification of all employees hired after November 6, 1987. If that verification reveals that an alien is not authorized to work, the employers will be required to comply with the new law's paper work. I will advise your association when the forms are available.

The documents needed to verify authorization to work are documents either from group a) or one document from both group b) and c).

Group a): The individual must have either a United States passport; certificate of US citizenship; certificate of naturalization; unexpired foreign passport, if the passport has an appropriate unexpired endorsement of the Attorney General authorizing employment in the United States; or resident alien card, if the card contains a photograph of the individual and an evidence of employment authorization in the United States.

Group b): A social security card which does not prohibit employment in the United States; a birth certificate in the United States or a certificate establishing US nationality at birth which is certified by the Attorney General or other documentation authorizing employment which has been accepted by the Attorney General.

Group c): A driver's license or similar document issued for purposes of identification by a state, if it contains a photograph of the individual or other personal identification information relating to the individual as the Attorney General finds acceptable or in the case of individual under 16, any other identification authorized by the Attorney General.

If the individual has any of the documents listed in paragraph a), that is sufficient. However, if there are none of the documents present in paragraph a), there must be both documents found in paragraph b) and c). In addition, the individual must attest under the penalty of perjury that he is authorized to work or is a citizen of the United States lawfully admitted for permanent residence.

Although it is not authorized to photostate a citizenship certificate or a permanent residence card, they may be photostated solely for this purpose.

Lawngrass Plants Per Square Inch

A good healthy lawn will be covered with about 6 grass plants per square inch. This amounts to over 8 million plants for the average sized lawn of 10,000 square feet. That's a lot of plants to care for. On the other hand, if one plant per square foot looks poor, there are sufficient healthy ones to provide good coverup. Blends of grasses and mixtures of compatible but different grasses help to assure the continued production of a blemish free turf.
