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

was usually to mix up a vat of arsenic-based nasties and apply liberally, isn't necessarily the best long-term way to ensure lush greenery. Superintendents today have the sophistication of an ecobiologist who understands both chemical and natural means of killing pests and turf diseases. On-course studies of chemical effects and after effects are up, and the use of harmful stuff is down. Today's golf course is usually built with a special concrete wash-up area for draining and flushing chemical-bearing equipment, again to prevent unwanted runoff.''

"Still, misinformation is ripe in today's green age. The New York State Environmental Protection Bureau issued a report in 1991 on health-related questions about golf and the environment. The report was provocatively titled 'Toxic Fairways', but the authors could only **speculate** about potential dangers of pesticides leaking into the groundwater: they simply **didn't have enough evidence.** Later, a team of scientists investigated ground water at four golf courses on Cape Cod, and while they found toxicologically significant levels of chemicals in the water, **none were pesticides being used on the golf courses.**"

"Still, the battles between environmental protectionists and developers trying to make a buck (or a few million of them) are joined almost every time someone says **golf course**."

Mr. Pollard finishes his article with a nightmarish story about the Arthur Hills Construction of the Sanctuary Golf on the island of Sanibel. After over 3 years in delays and over \$13 million in environmental cost over runs, \$2 million of which included the construction of a new sewage treatment plant that the owner John Naumann **donated** to the city, the golf course was finally completed. It is obvious that Mr. Pollard is on our side, I for one am glad he is not a member of Green Peace. Every seat on every airplane that United Airlines owns has this magazine in it. Quite possibly millions of people have read his story.

I felt compelled to relate some of his story to you so that you would all know that these problems are not going to disappear or be capably managed by anyone other than ourselves. We are on 'the front lines' every day. Our careers, our livelihoods, and our environment depend on the daily decisions that we make. I hope that Mr. Pollard's words help us all to realize more that the environmental battle wages on a national front. We must take the offensive, we must be proactive in our cause and take the initiative to show the world that we are true ... keepers of the green.



EPA Mows Down Pollution


The Environmental Protection Agency is slapping pollution controls on gas-powered garden tools to clear the air in places like Phoenix, where desert heat and piped-in water make lawn mowing a year-round chore.

The nationwide standards announced Wednesday in Washington are expected to add about \$5 to the cost of a mower, leaf blower, weed trimmer or other tool.

Running a mower for an hour creates as much pollution as driving a new car for 11¹/₂ hours, the EPA said. One hour of using a leaf blower equals 34 hours of driving; for a chain saw, 63 hours of driving; for a weed trimmer, 21 hours.


Nels Johnson Supports Superintendents' Hockey Team

GCSAA Membership Committee Meeting

April 22, 1994

As a member of the GCSAA Membership Committee, I attended our first meeting in Lawrence, KS on April 22, 1994. This committee is being revived as a result of input from the membership indicating they would like a larger format for expressing their views and opinions concerning GCSAA membership. Chairman Tommy Witt opened the meeting and we began discussing many issues regarding membership in GCSAA.

The amount of material we covered in one day was enormous and we didn't get to everything on the agenda. It became obvious that another meeting would be needed in the future. The committee agreed on the following concepts:

1. Building membership is desirable for many reasons.

2. Adding value to membership classes is desirable.

3. Turnover or attrition rate of memberships is low indicating members in general feel they get value for their membership.

4. There is a need to attract more members from nine-hole facilities.

5. Develop a separate marketing plan for smaller clubs and municipalities to help recruit members from these areas.

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Mandatory internship for Class A status is not appropriate at this time.

7. Merchandise program is too expensive. Use high quality merchandise, seek ways to purchase at a lower price, pass savings on to members.

8. Reference material program expanded to include Spanish and French versions of training tapes, and a book location service for members. Expand video library with more copies of popular tapes. Minimal charge or deposit with credit card to insure return of materials.

9. Much stronger public relations effort is needed through all types of media. GCSAA is headed in the right direction and we need to build on it now.

 Explore the possibilities of setting up a Credit Union for members.

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1984 Bull Sheets

The review of the 1954, '64 and '74 Bull Sheets are complete and it's time for the last in the series, the 1984 Bull Sheets.

In 1984 the Midwest President was Roger Stewart of Riverside Country Club. First Vice President was Joe Williamson of Briar Ridge; Second Vice President was Dave Behrman of Deer Creek; Secretary-Treasurer was Dave Meyer of Indian Lakes. Board members included Julius Albaugh, Westmoreland; Sean Daley, Ridge Country Club; Jim Evans, Turnberry; Mike Hart, Bon Vivant; Phil Taylor, Sugar Creek and Pete Leuzinger, St. Charles Country Club. Executive Secretary was Penny Meyer.

The **Bull Sheet** editor was Fred Opperman and associate editor was Len Berg. The **Bull Sheet** was up to twenty pages.

Paul Boizelle of Onwentsia Golf Club was a National Director and as the year started, was a candidate for Vice President of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America. Unfortunately, this bid was not successful.

Meetings were held at the Marriott Lincolnshire Resort, Rich Hahn, host; Nordic Hills, Dave Meyer, host; Woodridge Golf Club, Tony Meyer, host; Kankakee Elks (joint meeting with CIGCS) Bill Bonnett, host; Old Elm, Ed Fischer, host; Sportman's Golf Club, Tim Miles, host; Riverside Country Club, Roger Stewart, host; Turnberry Country Club, Jim Evans, host; Itasca Country Club, Jim Meyer, host and Cress Creek, Gilberto Velazquez, host.

The only golf scores addressed in the 1984 **Bull Sheet** were the Old Elm meeting. Among others, (tied with a net 58 score) were Bob Breen, Sr., Bob Breen, Jr., Bill Leith and Ray Schei. Nets of 56 and 57 were shot by Jeff Smith, Tom Morgenson and Phil Bersin.

The 1984 Bull Sheet did have a tremendous number of excellent meaty articles. Those considered for the 1984 Ray Gerber Award were: September '83 - "Everything You Did Not Want to Know About Moles" - John Stephenson, CGCS; December '83 - "All Goods Worth Price Charges" - Al Fierst; March '84 - "How Well Do You Know Your Trees" - Robert K. Breen, "GCS Trip" - Michael Hart, CGCS, "Budgeting of Golf Course Management" - Bruce Williams; April '84 - "The Good Old Ways" (this is in two parts April and May) - Edward Wollenberg, "Fairway Maintenance and Improvement -The Total Approach" - Bruce Williams; May '84 - "Vandalism" - Patrick Klein; June '84 - "Vertical Mowing of Fairways for Improvement of Renovation" - Bruce Williams; July '84 -- "Management of Pythium" - Alan Fierst; August '84 - "Fairway Soil Aerification - A Cultural Practice or Renovation Process" - Julius Albaugh, "Fairway Recontouring" -David Ward, "Lightning Can Strike Without Warning" - Bruce Williams.

I don't know who the judges were, but judging these entries, all of which were very good, had to be a tremendous effort. The winner was Bruce Williams with "Lightning Can Strike Without Warning". An honorable mention was given to Ed Wollenberg, "The Good Old Days" (this was my personal favorite — Ed was earning 47½ cents an hour as an Olympia Fields Country Club grounds employee in 1941 when he entered the armed forces for \$21 per month). Other favorites were Mike Hart, GCS trip, a tongue in cheek chronicle of his cost saving trip to the National in Las Vegas using the GCSAA travel agent. And the article "Vandalism" by the late Pat Klein of Hillcrest Country Club. This novel approach on vandalism could be used today by any golf course with houses along most of the fairways and no fences. I would urge Fred Opperman to re-print this unique article soon.

In 1984 Dr. Bill Daniel was the winner of the USGA Green Section Award. The MGCSA was refining its employment referral committee. The GCSAA was redoing its relatively new certification program. Mike Hart reported on the updated certification program in the March issue.

The January Trivia Quiz was: What do Norm Johnson, Don Strand, Bert Rost, Bill Stupple, Ted Woehrle, Doug Jabaay, Tom Burrows, Dick Trevarthan, Roger LaRochelle and Ray Gerber have in common? I knew the answer, do you? (They were all **Bull Sheet** editors).

Also highlighted was the fact that Bill Leith, Jr. had been the superintendent at Elgin Country Club for 21 years (31 years in '94) and that he succeeded his dad, Bill Leith Sr., who had been Pro-Superintendent for 34 years.

Also obvious were the monthly contributions of official MGCSA poet laureate — Ken Zanzig. These contributions started at some point in the decade between 1974 and 1984 and as you know, continue today.

After reading and reporting on the 1954, '64, '74 and '84 **Bull Sheets**, I would like to make the following observations:

The quality and professionalism of **The Bull Sheet** has increased greatly over the years and continues to do so in 1994.

The Bull Sheet editors have worked very diligently over the years to provide this vehicle for the exchange of timely information which also serves as chronicle of the history of the organization as well as the profession.

Golf course conditioning, golf course equipment, ecology, employee relations, membership (golfer) relations are but a few of the issues addressed on a monthly basis by **The Bull Sheet**. Contributors range from officers of The Midwest and The National, local superintendents, reprints from other chapter newsletters, representatives from various manufacturers and distributors and other miscellaneous sources. All of this combines to make **The Bull Sheet** a nationally recognized chapter newsletter.

I have certainly enjoyed researching and writing this series and hope the readers have enjoyed reading the articles.
