The 1954 Bull Sheets

While doing some research on the year of 1954 as part of a project commemorating Illinois Lawn's fortieth year in business, I read the 12 issues of the **Bull Sheet** published in 1954 that were in Fred Opperman's files.

I discovered that they were not only interesting, but were rich in the history of the Midwest Golf Course Superintendents Association and Chicago area golf in general. In 1954 MAGCS officers were George Roloff of Roselle Country Club (now Schaumburg Golf Club), President; Frank Dinelli of Northmoor, First Vice President; Walter Kilmer of Ravisloe Country Club, Second Vice President; Al Johnson of the Indian Hill Club, Secretary/Treasurer; and Directors were Ray Davis of Medinah Country Club, Bill Stupple of Exmoor and Bill Kraft of Southmoor (Palos C.C.). 1954 GCSAA officers included Norm Johnson (formally at LaGrange Country Club but relocated to San Jose Country Club in Jacksonville, Florida as President). Bob Williams and Detroit-area superintendent Andy Bertoni (well known in Chicago from his W.A. Cleary days) were Directors.

Bill Stupple was Editor of the **Bull Sheet**. Associate editors were Bert Rost, Al Johnson and Bob Williams. Art Director was Paul Burditt, Paul was a real workhorse for the **Bull Sheet**. He was the official photographer, submitted a monthly column, "Spreading It Thin," under the pseudonym "The Mole". This was a gossip-type column with a wealth of interesting golf course studies and goings on. Most 1954 superintendents did not know that Paul Burdett was "The Mole". In addition, Paul was the "ghost writer" of many other **Bull Sheet** articles. Another hard working midwest member was Bob Williams who was a member of the Midwest's Educational Committee, Chairman of the GCSA Educational Committee and a member of the U.S.G.A. Green Section Educational Committee.

Frank Dinelli, who was credited in the 1954 **Bull Sheets** for solving several differences of opinion, was often referred to by Dr. Bill Daniel and many of his peers as "Dean of the Greenskeepers."

All of the 1954 **Bull Sheet** issues had eight pages. The last two pages were advertising with the biggest ad, being a quarter page in size.

Meeting Highlights:

The May meeting was held at Glen Eagles Country Club, Walter Fuchs - Host. Advance information; a statement from club manager, George Cox. He said, "No friend of Walter's will go away hungry." One task Walter faced was the uprighting and resetting of a 100-foot pontoon bridge that had blown over during the winter. Fred Grau, who was with West Point Products Co. at that time, demonstrated an early version aerifier and verticut machine at the meeting.

The September meeting was the joint meeting with the Wisconsin Greenskeepers Association. It was held at North Hills Country Club, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Host Superintendent was Charley Shiley. Midwest members were urged to attend as Charley was a former assistant to Ray Didier at Tam-O-Shanter.







Midwest Golf Club is constructing a new house on the golf course for Superintendent, Marv Gruening.




1954 Omissions & Corrections by Pete Vandercook

1994 M.A.G.C.S. Voting Delegates Report

We would like to thank the membership of MAGCS, the MAGCS Board of Directors, and Bruce Williams for their confidence in us to fulfill the duties of Voting Delegate. We take this responsibility seriously and cast the votes for MAGCS as dictated by the members present at our caucus. We also would like to recognize the determined effort of Len Berg in registering as many votes as possible for MAGCS. There is no doubt that MAGCS would not have the largest number of votes for any single chapter if it were not for Len's determination.

In brief, all the proposed By-Laws were passed with the exception of those on Ballot 5 and Ballot 6. Ballot 5 was a proposed change that would have created several new classifications of GCSAA membership for golf course employees. Ballot 6 was a proposed change that would have created a new GCSAA membership classification for club and or association official. Both of these proposals failed to pass by the required 2/3 majority vote. Joe Baidy was elected GCSAA President and Gary Grigg was elected Vice President. Bruce Williams was nominated from the floor to run for Director and received the highest number of votes in the Director's race. Paul McGinnis and Scott Woodhead were re-elected to two year terms along with Bruce Williams. Tommy Witt received the next highest number of votes followed by Charles Passios. President Baidy introduced Bruce Williams as the newly appointed Secretary/ Treasurer and appointed Tommy Witt to fill the remaining Director position.

Having such a strong candidate as Bruce Williams makes our job much easier. We are proud to have represented Bruce Williams and the MAGCS at Dallas and look forward to doing the same in San Francisco in 1995. One of the By-Law changes that was approved this year changes the race for the Vice President position to a race for the Secretary/Treasurer's position in the future. This means that if Bruce Williams is nominated for Vice President in 1995, he will run unopposed (barring nominations from the floor) in San Francisco and do likewise for President in 1996 in Orlando. Anything can happen in GCSAA politics in two years, but we feel confident that Bruce Williams' commitment to the future of our profession will carry him to the Presidency in 1996. Please join us in congratulating Bruce Williams on his re-election and subsequent appointment to the position of Secretary/Treasurer of GCSAA.






Leaves, Limbs, Needles & Boughs

Trivia question: What American tree is particularly suited for food containers?

This months selection is great for mass plantings in out of the way areas. It has the tendency to spread by suckers and grows in colonies and groups. Rhus glabra — Smooth Sumac is a small tree reaching 15 to 20 feet in height. Trunks diameter will maybe reach 6-8 inches.



Leaves: Alternate, pinnately compound, with up to 31 leaflets; leaflets lance shaped, up to 4 inches long, less than 2 inches broad, sharp pointed at the apex, toothed along the edges, green and smooth on the upper surface, nearly white and smooth on the lower side. Leaves turn a brilliant orange purple red in the fall.

Bark: Light brown, smooth on the young plants, becoming somewhat rough at maturity.



Buds: More or less rounded, smooth, about 1/8 inch long. Flowers: Staminate and pistillate sometime borne on separate plants, sometimes on the same plant and sometimes in the same flower.

Fruit: Cluster of red berries, each berry round and smooth up to 1/8 inch in diameter and containing a single seed.

Trivia answer: The American beech, for it does not impart any taste or odor.
