Nursery responded, completing the project in 1999 at the nursery's Momence farm.

achieve To the look Leuzinger desired, H&E tested a variety of blends at the University of Illinois test plots and finally settled on a custom blend of three bluegrasses and three fescues. According to H&E's turf special-Darin Habenicht, combination of grasses does quite well in dry, shaded areas to 65% and will maintain a consistent color with no mottling. Habenicht adds that the blend grows equally well on both sandy loam or mineral-based soils.

While somewhat thinner than traditional bluegrass, this blended turf is aesthetically pleasing and tends to wave majestically in the breeze. Its somewhat lighter green color is perfect for use in the rough and around bunkers,







because there it accentuates the lush, deep green colors of bent fairways and greens. Moreover, it is a perfect turf for low-maintenance and light-irrigation areas.

Jeff Leuzinger said, "I'm happy with the results and our membership gives the look high marks. We achieved what we set out to do." Because this sod is newly developed, it was available only in limited quantities this spring, but availability should be plentiful by fall. All H&E locations—Markham, Harvard, Momence and Wauconda—carry the fescue/bluegrass blend and will cut it in H&E's "BigRoll" or the traditional small rolls.

principal source of water for agricultural irrigation in some areas. Although it can be used for turf in some instances, it generally is not recommended due to the high level of nutrients and other compounds it can contain.

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While wastewater engineers are concerned primarily (or only) with pathogen levels in effluent, superintendents must also consider the many management issues associated with use of effluent for

golf course irrigation. From an agronomic stance, effluent can have effects on both turf and soil qualities. There are often additional financial considerations that must be met-effluent water is not necessarily "free." Many regulatory issues must be met before effluent can be brought onto a golf course and used for irrigation.

The four main characteristics of effluent water that dictate its utility for any situation are 1) Biological components, 2) Organic components, 3) Dissolved salts and nutrients (including heavy metals) and 4) Dissolved and suspended solids. Wastewater treatment faciligenerally reduce the ties concentration of biological and organic components to a minimum. The potential for problems and remedies associated with dissolved salts, nutrients and solids will be discussed in a future issue.

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
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
