



Ray is survived by his wife Deborah, his daughter Rhonda, his son Joe and Joe's new bride of three weeks, and his father Sid.




FROM THE GCSAA

GCSAA Implements New Member Database System

To provide enhanced services and increased flexibility to members, the GCSAA is converting to a new database system in July. This upgrade in technology will expand the association's capabilities and provide members with easier access to membership information 24 hours a day. The new system also will accommodate information relative to the Professional Development Initiative (PDI). Within 18 months, members will have the ability to view their education transcripts online and access other member-related information.

Members may experience a slight delay in the processing of their requests while GCSAA makes this conversion. All information received by the service center and through GCSAA Online during the month of July will be processed in the order it is received in as timely a manner as possible. Look for more information in the coming months about these exciting new features and when they will be available.
