
mouth). You might use terms like jammy, big, mellow, chewy and a host of others.



- · To make a food seem less spicy, serve a white wine.
- To make a food appear spicier, serve a red wine.
- · Serve a more acidic wine with olive oil-based dishes.
- If a wine is earthy in flavors, serve it with root vegetables.
- · Anything really goes, as long as you enjoy it!

There has been many a summer evening where my weary husband has come home from a long day at the course and found solace in a good glass of wine and a good cigar! If he can, you can, too.





BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

The following are highlights of the MAGCS Board of Directors meeting held Tuesday, November 11, at Midwest Golf House. This was the first meeting of the 2004 Board with Fred Behnke presiding and Luke Cella present in the capacity of executive director. Full meeting minutes, once approved, are available on the Midwest Web site.

- The Board determined that one focus for 2004 will be "improving and enhancing the individual and collective prestige and efficiency of the members."
- Executive Director Luke Cella will be investigating improvements to the MAGCS Web site.
- The Association's archival material will henceforth have a proper home at Midwest Golf House. Luke is to begin collecting archival material for appropriate storage and/or display.
- The Board approved entering On Course in the 2003 GCSAA chapter newsletter competition. The Editorial Committee later opted to submit the February 2003 issue.
- Committee co-chairs earned a new responsibility: in the absence of the committee's primary chair, co-chairs will present that committee's report at Board meetings.
- The Board charged President Emeritus Kevin DeRoo with launching the bylaw-change process. Certain bylaws may be updated to reflect newer technologies and procedures, such as e-mail notifications, etc.
- The Board designated Fred Behnke, Scott Witte, Kevin DeRoo, Paul Bastron, Scott Speiden and John Gurke to attend the awards banquet at NCTE on Tuesday, December 2.





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It's a frequently asked question: Are chapter meetings eligible for both education points and service points? The answer: Chapter meetings are eligible for **EITHER** education or service points, but never both. Here's the breakdown.

Education Points

Members will receive 0.1 education points for each hour of pre-approved education offered at a chapter meeting. If your chapter meeting has received pre-approval for education points, your members must submit the event approval code as verification of their attendance and to validate the established program criteria. To do this, members must log on to Member Central after the chapter meeting and complete an Education Point for Pre-Approved Educational Event education point affidavit.

Service Points

Chapter meetings without preapproved education would be eligible for service points. Members will receive 0.1 service points for attending the meeting. Following the meeting, the member must log on to Member Central and complete the Chapter Monthly Meetings Without Approved Education service point affidavit to receive credit.

Affiliated Chapter Officers, Board Members, Committee Members Receive Service Points

One more great reason to get involved at the chapter level . . . affiliated chapter officers and board members receive 0.5 point service points per year of service. GCSAA staff automatically awards these points at the end of each completed year of service. Your chapter's committee members can also receive service points. They can receive 0.25 service points per committee (not to exceed 0.5 points per year, with a maximum of 1.25 points per renewal period). To receive credit for chapter committee service, please complete a service point affidavit, available through GCSAA.

Their discussion revealed the many discoveries that can be gleaned from conducting a soil survey on a parcel of property (from differing turfgrass responses to "inputs" to dead mob guys). Next on the agenda was soonto-be new Board member Scott Witte, who reflected on what's happened since his last time at the podium in "It's Been Eight Years . . . " Scott provided us with some painful reminders of the common mistakes we have probably all made, including substituting RoundUp for some other gold liquid in the spray tank (and the nasty results thereafter), and becoming so involved in our work that our spouses feel compelled to deliver the old "you gotta kick it up a notch" speech. Tom D'Avello followed Scott with a talk on GIS mapping of soils and its benefits.

Prior to the lunch break, the big moment came—the presentation of the Ray Gerber and Fred D. Opperman Editorial Awards. Dave Ward won an unprecedented third Gerber with his article "Preparing for the 2003 U. S. Open," and Erwin McKone took home his second consecutive Opperman (soon to

be renamed the Erwin McKone Editorial Award).

Then Kevin DeRoo took center stage to recognize donations to the MAGCS Scholarship Fund. J.W. Turf donated \$2,500 toward the John Buck Scholarship, Simplot Partners donated \$4,000 from their Daconil early-order program and AXA Advisors donated \$500, which Larry Tomaszewski generously matched out of his own pocket. Thank you to all contributors to this important cause.

Following lunch (and a hasty trip to the Jewel deli section to replenish the meat tray), Dr. Mike Boehm of THE Ohio State University spoke on the "Microbiology of Soils, Products and Techniques," stressing that most all of the "bugs in a jug" potions being sold are worthless without the employment of sound agronomic principles, first and foremost. Tony Kalina was next, offering his own reflections on the past eight years, and made a great point-that speaking at the MAGCS Clinic is not something to fret about, but an opportunity.
