Sunshine Through Golf Foundation

Starting under Mike Nass at Bryn Mawr Country Club as an equipment technician in 1984, he continued to work with Mike at Cantigny from 1987-1991, with Tony Rzadski from 1991-1995 and with Scott Witte from 1995-2002. Chris wore a lot of hats at Cantigny.

He started out as the turf equipment technician, became a plant health care technician and finally earned the roll of assistant superintendent at the Youth Links in 1997. During Chris's time at Cantigny, he studied hard and completed his studies in Turfgrass Management at Joliet Junior College.

In 2002, Chris got his first head superintendent position at Downers Grove Golf Club where he stayed until 2005. Since then, Chris has been at the CDGA's

Three-Hole Sunshine Course serving as Superintendent and Facility Manager.

As a true south-sider, Chris is a proud White Sox fan and resides in Chicago. He is currently in the process of building a home in Lockport with his girlfriend Heather and her son Zachary. Chris has been performing the roll of contractor for the home, and has encountered many challenges along the way.

He has always been a "jack of all trades", and is always the guy to call when I get stuck on a project. No matter what the challenge, I always admire Chris's "can do attitude".

Chris's "jack of all trades" abilities have served the CDGA well as he is always helping out with various projects throughout the grounds and facilities at Midwest Golf House. You might find him repairing light fixtures, working with the HVAC system or acting as an intermediary for the CDGA meeting with several contractors.

The most interesting adjustment that Chris has had to make at the Sunshine Course has been the fact that he is now cultivating disease as well as turf.

He gets to see first hand how all the different varieties of turf respond to normal and extreme conditions. Much can be learned from watching the natural progression of turfgrass diseases in different varieties of turf.


This wonderful getaway retreat has been Chris's special project over the last several years. He has spent countless hours refining his creation for himself and those closest to him.


