This spring Dave went through all of his bunkers and added sand to provide a uniform depth of six inches in every section of every bunker. He also replaced the sand directly above the tile lines, and this has significantly improved his bunker drainage.

This project required 20 loads of sand and 750 manhours for 69 bunkers.


to you gentlemen for your efforts in

Of the 125 total acres, 85 acres were stripped to dirt for the project. Wadsworth Golf Course Construction and Leibold Irrigation are the chief contractors on the project, slated for completion this year.

GCSAA	Proposed Usage: Alternate Primary Logo Usage: This mark would be used when sizing would cause legibility problems with wording or when directed to audiences fully familiar with the GCSAA acronym.
SUPPENNTEMOSIAS BESOCIATION	Proposed Usage: Official Seal Usage: This mark would be used as the official seal of the association. Its use would be significantly restricted to only communications or situations appropriate for a corporate seal.

Second, be it known that if you are a non-certified Class A member of GCSAA who was grandfathered A on July 1, 2003, when the membership standards were implemented through PDI, you were also grandfathered with the eligibility requirements for certification application that were in effect at that time. Your certification grandfathered status will end on July 1, 2008. If you have not achieved certification applicant status, you will be subject to the requirements implemented with the 2003 membership standards. 



APRIL EDUCATION RECAP

I have always thought that the geese on my golf course are just too lazy and indolent to migrate with the more conscientious minded geese. But according to our April meeting speaker, Carla Wagner of Wild Goose Chase, the geese that are overwhelming the golf courses and parklands of Illinois are actually a species of non-migratory geese. Their non-migratory status and place of residence is imprinted to the place of their hatching.

The Giant Canada Goose was a threatened species that our Federal Government reintroduced to our area in the 1960's. The success of this program has been incredible: the average nesting pair of Giant Canada geese clutches 4-6 eggs every year with a 90% survival rate. In five years, one pair of Giant Canada geese can easily become a flock.

All that property mangers may legally do to mitigate the health, environmental, and recreational nuisance that these vermin are causing is to harass them or apply for a permit to addle the eggs as they are laid each spring.

Egg addling is best achieved by shaking the eggs to destroy the yolk, or by dipping them into corn oil to suffocate the embryo. Both methods are very effective for stabilizing the Giant Canada goose population, but egg addling must be done before the eggs are two weeks old.

In Illinois you must apply for a permit each year to shake or dip the eggs. The contact person for applying for your permit is:

Give yourself plenty of time to apply for your permit. I applied for my 2007 permit in November of 2006, and I received it in February. It is a good idea to mark your calendar today as a reminder to apply for your permit this fall.

Successful egg addling occurs at a time when we are generally most preoccupied by a multitude of daily goals and objectives, so you may need to adjust your work schedule and labor budget in April to assure that you will have the adequate number of trained staff on hand to locate the nests for addling the eggs.
