TRANSPORTATION TRAVEL TIPS

The Rock Island, in conjunction with the Southern Pacific, has submitted the following attractive itinerary for the going trip in connection with our forthcoming turf conference and equipment show in Los Angeles. In view of the great number who intend remaining in California for sometime following the conference adjournment, no attempt is to be made to organize on the return.

The very popular train, the Imperial, NO. 39, or a section thereof, will be used from the La Salle Street Station, La Salle and Van Buren Streets, Chicago, Wednesday, February 2. The Imperial provides air conditioned standard sleeping cars with drawing rooms, compartments, and sectional space, tourist sleeping cars, full lounge car and diner.

During the stopover at El Paso the sleepers will be parked for occupancy at a convenient location.

Shortly after your arrival special busses will be provided for the trip across the International Bridge to Juarez, Mexico. You may want to try a Mexican dish at one of the famous Juarez cafes, - bargain with Native street vendors or browse through picturesque curio shops. It's fun. Busses will return you to our sleepers.

Up bright and early the next morning, February 4, and following breakfast at the Union Station dining room you depart about 6:30 AM for the motor trip to Carlsbad Caverns - the world's most glam-orous underground fairyland. Every room of Carlsbad Caverns National Park is pervaded by such a strange resemblance to a magnificent stage setting, such awe-inspiring hugeness - that visitors find it hard to realize that there is a commonplace world of sunlight to return to. During your visit in the Caverns, you will find yourself moving as in a dream scarcely believing that which your eyes behold, as one glorious vista after another unfolds before you. You hesitate to speak, lest these exquisite panoramas fade from view. This spell of enchant-ment grips you throughout the entire trip, as you go from one room to another amazed at the sheer sight of things, and delighted with their delicate beauty. We return to our train about 5:30 PM and have our evening meal in the dining car.

This thriving city, in the Valley of the Sun, prosperous, modern is doubly interesting when it is understood how many past civilizations have been founded on the selfsame site.
