January 1, 1954.

That the Nomination Committee be allowed to select a slate of officers as it saw fit and not be held to selecting two nominees for each office.

An auditing committee consisting of Amos Lapp, Bert Rost and Ray Gerber was appointed by Pres. Davis.

The Treasurers annual report was accepted as read and Pres. Davis thanked all members and committees for their help during the year.

The meeting was then turned over to the Nominating Committee Chairman, Ray Gerber, for the election of officers for 1953. Officers elected were as follows: President, Ray Davis; 1st Vice President, George Roloff; 2nd Vice President, Henry Lange; Secretary, Al Johnson; Treasurer, Walter Killmer; Directors, Roy Chaplin and Bert Rost.

All National members were asked to get their proxies in to Delegate Ray Gerber before February 2.
