Dr. Voigt and Dr. Rhodes of the Drug and Horticultural Station at Downers Grove suggested that they would grow the plants at the station. They did. The Midwest and the combined Research and Educational Committees thank the Station and the University and Dusty and Dr. Voigt.

This is tangible evidence of the increased interest by the University in our problems, this was the first act of active cooperation, of helpfulness in the promotion of the solution of our problems. This spring, in March the University and the Station helped us to stage our first Short Course which was a success and which we hope will be repeated in 1954. The Research Committee and I thank our membership for turning out in such numbers and completeing the planting so well and so promptly.

The ground was first aerified with one inch spoons in strips two feet apart. Seedlings were placed in the two outside rows and the center row in every fourth hole. The seedlings were carefully placed and a core of soil forced back into the hole with the seedling and firmed down. We were very fortunate in having considerable precipitation the preceding day and the ground was in fine shape for the planting. A number of two inch plugs were also put into the fairway under the supervision of Dr. Bill Daniel, who was our guest that day. The whole planting operation took about an hour and a half. Fortunately, we had a little shower soon after the planting, so the seedlings should do all right.

Dr. Daniel had several extra flats of seedlings which he distributed among some of the men for planting on their own courses.

THE MOLE

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EARLY SEASON TROUBLES

A number of the boys in the district report early troubles. There have been reports of fungus on greens, ranging from "red ring fungus" on shaded areas of turf on greens and tees to a more serious type of fungus which Ray Didier had on his greens last spring and it is reported that he has it again this year. The red ring stuff does not seem to be very serious, it coming in in periods of wet cloudy weather and clearing up during dry, sunny weather. It doesn't seem to spread and just thins the grass out. The other is much more serious and is a real problem. Ray reports that copper fungicides have been helpful in clearing up the trouble.

Desiccation of bent, especially "old bent" in fairways is anothe problem which is troubling the men this spring. It seems that there is very little root system in much of it and in periods of dry windy weather the bent is apt to fade if not watered. It seems to come back all right but there is always the possibility of infestation of Poa Annua and weeds until it does.

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
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
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
