At the meeting, President Ed Stewart asked for nominations for our selection for nomination for Director of the National for 1959. Unanimously selected was Roy Nelson. Roy is a hard worker for the Association and we think he is the ideal man for the job.

WISCONSIN NOTES

On September 9, we met with our neighbors from Illinois, the Midwest Association of Golf Course Superintendents at Brynwood Country Club in Milwaukee. Lester Verhaalen was our host. 66 golfers enjoyed playing the marvelously conditioned golf course in the afternoon. O. J. Noer and Charley Wilson were there and took many of those present on a tour of the fertilizer plots being conducted by them at Brynwood. After a social meeting, president Frank Musbach called the meeting to order at 8:00 P.M. 114 members of our association and the Midwest and guests were present at dinner and the meeting. 70 had been present for the noon lunch and 66 entered the golf tournament. Being a special meeting, President Musbach dispensed with the regular order of business and proceeded to introduce the many well known guests present. Among them were Midwest president Ed Stewart; National President Bob Williams; Jim Holmes, agronomist of the Greens Section of the United States Golf Association; Agar Brown, National Secretary-Treasurer; O. J. Noer and Charles Wilson of the Milwaukee Sewerage Commission; Bill Stupple, Editor of The Bull Sheet; C. E. (Scotty Stewart), irrigation engineer; and our host Lester Verhaalen, Superintendent of Brynwood Country Club. Midwest president Ed Stewart expressed appreciation of the high quality of maintenance at Brynwood and complimented Lester on his ability to keep the course in such fine shape during trying weather. National President Bob Williams and Secretary Agar Brown highlighted the many advantages of belonging to the National Association and talked about the coming conference and show to be held in Chicago next January. Jim Holmes pointed out how one broadened his knowledge of turf culture and discussed the advantages of the United States Golf Association Greens section. (3) Mixtures of other fertilizers and Milorganite. Test plots on soil sterilents are also being established. No fungicide or insecticides has been used on the test plots. Mr. Smith of Aero-Thatch was thanked for the demonstration of his machine on the practice green at Brynwood. Ray Mertens, Golf Chairman, announced that the Midwest retained the Midwest-Wisconsin Team Trophy by a single stroke, 328 to 329 for Wisconsin.
