The old saying is, a good looking green is not always a good putting green, and the golfer is interested in a good putting green.

Our July 6th meeting will be held at St. Andrews Golf Club. Amos Lapp will be our host Superintendent. Come out and enjoy yourself. All of us will be looking for you.

I wonder how many of us that play golf at our monthly meetings keep in mind the items a golfer should do and the things he should not do in order to help make the game of golf more enjoyable for those who are to follow us. There are times when we get too interested in who won the prox and forget to repair the ball hole on the green, or neglect to smoothe out our foot tracks in the sand traps, or are in too much of a hurry to replace the divots. Next time we are playing golf let us remember the three R's:

REPLACE DIVOTS RAKE SAND TRAPS REPAIR BALL HOLES ON GREENS

First, find out what caused your problem and work from there on.

Dr. Burklund of the Department of Horticulture of the University of Illinois announced the definite intention of establishing a Demonstration Turf Garden to be located on the grounds of the Drug and Horticultural Experiment Station which ajoins the east edge of the Morton Arboretum West of Downers Grove, Illinois. This Turf Demonstration Garden is the first effort on the part of the University to aid Northern Illinois Home Owners with one of their most difficult problems, that of keeping a good lawn and it is possible the work could be extended to include research and extention.

Dr. Burklund announced that his budget would enable him to keep at least one full time laborer on this job and that the work would be under the direction of extention workers from the Department of Floriculture and would be assisted by Mike Brittan who has done considerable work at Purdue with Bill Daniels. Mike is now with the Department of Horticulture as a Plant Pathologist.

The announcement was made at an informal meeting held at the Drug and Horticultural Experiment Station and attended by many representative members of the industry and of the University Staff. Raymond Gerber, president of the Midwest and Bert Rost Editor of the Bull Sheet represented the Midwest Association, Mr. Gager Vaughan, of Vaughan's Seed Store and Dr. John Walters, Chairman of the Committee for the Chicago District Golf Association, attended the meeting. Farm bureau workers from Cook and Will County advised that they also planned to duplicate the plots in their counties. Dr. Wienard of the Dept. of Floriculture suggested that plans for the layout of the plots be drawn up. After Luncheon the group visited the Trial plots already established in the Vaughan Experimental and trial gardens at the Cantigne Farm at Wheaton, Illinois. Last summer these gardens had a constant flow of interested visitors. We are pleased that the University is taking this step. There is room in the area under consideration at the station for any research or demonstration work the Midwest and the Chicago District Golf Association may plan and Mike Brittan has already selected a location on a green in a sheltered, shady, damp place where grass may not possibly thrive and where disease is sure to thrive.

The Picnic will be held August 18th at Sycamore Park District. Emil Cassier is the Supt. there and we have always had a wonderful time. In addition to Golf, the Sycamore Park has a beautiful Picnic Grove and an excellent swimming pool. Set the day aside and alert the kids and tell Mom that is the date.

Pete Bild of Woodridge is still in Hines Hospital but the reports we get are that he is steadily progressing and is walking with canes. Get well fast Pete, we've been missing you.

L. G. Bedenbender of Rushville, Ill. has taken over the greenkeeping activities at Woodridge Country Club. Mr. Bedenbender has been County Supt. of Schools in Southern Ill. for 16 years and has worked on courses rather as a hobby for the last 6 years. He seems to have an excellent understanding of turf.

IRRIGATED BLUE GRASS FAIRWAYS

The University of Illinois 18 hole Golf Course at Savoy, Illinois, just south of Champaign, is unusual in that with irrigation fairways originally seeded to Kentucky Blue Grass, the fairways are still a thick blue grass turf after ten years of operation. It is usually thought that blue grass and fescue turf on fairways will gradually recede and give way to poa annua and bent with the introduction of irrigation. Not so at the University of Illinois Course.

Clint Buckles, the Superintendent, decided to keep his blue grass turf and to follow maintenance practices that would do just that. How does he do it? First of all, he has good soil favorable to blue grass. He never cuts below one inch, fertilizes liberally several times a season, and waters sparingly. During the summer months water is applied about every two weeks and then in liberal amount per application. Clint doesn't believe in frequent watering, but waits 'til the turf shows need for it. Then with plant food available, the response to watering is prompt and vigorous.

No doubt the height of cut is most important, but so are his fertilizing and watering practices. On June 15th, his fairway turf was thick and clean, making for excellent ball lies for fairway shots. The density of the turf offsets the height of the grass.


