END OF LAWN MOWING SEEN

Ten years from now you will be able to sit on a lawn that needs no mowing and reach up to pick a normal sized peach from the low branches of a dwarf tree.

This will be possible because within 10 years we will have an "anti-gibberellin." This startling announcement comes from Dr. James A. Lockhart, biologist at the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena.

Gibberellin, the hormone that plants secrete to induce stem growth, has been widely studied, Dr. Lockhart pointed out. Considerable research is under way to discover an anti-gibberellin which would suppress the growth of plants without affecting their ability to flourish and yield normal crops.

An application of this anti-gibberellin - perhaps in a spray form or as an additive to fertilizer - could slow plant growth so that grass, for example, would need virtually no trimming. Fruit trees treated with the anti-growth substance would be the same as normal trees except for their shortened stems or trunks. Dr. Lockhart based his prediction of the properties of the antigibberellin on what he has learned about gibberellin.

The hormone affects young cells, especially in the plant stem, promoting stem growth by counteracting the effects of sunlight. Light slows down growth by making the young cell walls more rigid. Gibberellin enables the cell walls to stretch, growing longer but not wider.

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NEW SERVICE BUILDING AT NORTH SHORE COUNTRY CLUB

Ray Davis, Superintendent of North Shore, is proud of his new service building, not yet completely finished. It took five years for Ray to promote this project.

The new building is 180' x 50', divided by walls into three areas. The center area is 80' x 50' and will be used for equipment storage. This section has three overhead doors, 10'8" x 8' on the south side for quick and easy access. The west area is 60' x 50', designed for storage of soil, fertilizer, and chemicals, and is equipped with one 12' x 12'6" door on the end to accomodate semi-trailers for unloading. The front end of the building faces east, where the Superintendent's Office is located. The east end area, 40' x 50', is insulated and heated for service and repair operations.

The building is of prefabricated steel construction with cement floors thur-out. The total cost will be approximately \$33,000.00 Building-floor only costs about \$3.25 per square foot with heat, power, light, and plumbing, accounting for the balance. The old building was an old farmer's barn and served the club as the service headquarters for 36 years. It was a fire hazard, as well as inefficient and uncomfortable. The new building was planned by Ray Davis, and in his estimation, is just what a golf course service building should be.

DRY WEATHER IMPROVES SOIL

Drought is a plague to all plantsmen, but it appears there is some good in all things, even in drought. According to H. H. Krusekopf, soil scientist of the University of Missouri, drought improves the soil making it more workable and actually more productive. Complete drying, he says, destroys the water film that normally surrounds soil particles, causing them to move together and for maggregates and granules. This, in turn, results in a higher percentage of pore space in the soil, better soil aeration and, when the rains come again, more moisture absorption and better plant growth. The granulating effect of drought is most apparent and most beneficial in clay soils, and may persist for two or more years following termination of the dry weather. The effects of drying and freezing soils are similar, except that freezing makes only the surface soil more friable while drying affects both the surface and the subsoil.

The superintendent was taking stock of his bags of fertilizer and when it came to counting a certain brand he discovered a neat little problem which he took home to his 14 year old son. The boy solved the problem when his father said that if he counted the certain brand by three, there was a remainder of two bags, then when he counted by five there was still a remainder of two bags, but when he counted by sevens there was a remainder of five bags.

Question: How many bags of the certain brand of fertilizer did he have?



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
