Later that month the Annual Spring Golf Tournament was held on June 22, 1953 at Bonnie Dundee. Ray Gerber won the Seniors title with a blistering 39-38-77. His best round ever. Jock Anderson was the low net winner.

LAST MONTH'S MEETING

The May meeting was held at the Ridge Country Club on May 7th. The weather was warm, clear and windy. The Course was in top condition. Charlie Rack, the Host Superintendent gave us a good golf course to play on. There were 42 entries in the Peoria Handicap Tournament. Vern Raschi was the winner with the following men close behind: John Ebel, Emil Mashie, Harold Michels, Norm Barnes, Art Benson, Sr. and Joe Canale. John Coghill and Paul Voykin were also winners.

After a wonderful day of golf we all settled down to a delicious meal followed by a good meeting. The educational program dominated most of the evening. Co-Chairmen of the Educational Committee Warren Bidwell and Dudley Smith presented Bill Stupple to the membership for one of his outstanding jobs in conducting the Question Box. Here are some of the Questions and Answers that transpired during this period.



Q. It anybody having trouble with the new product, Dyrene?

A. No one present at the meeting had used the product but there were some rumors that several of the Superintendents had used this Fungicide last year with no trouble. This year seems to be too early for its use. There were two cases cited where some slight tip burn had occured this spring.

Q. Did the May 1st frost have much effect on the turf in the Chicago area?

A. Not much except in the color aspect. The old Washington Bent greens turned a little purple.

Q. What treatment on Bent Fairways has been successful for the control of Knotweed?

A. Most of the Superintendents present stated that they have been having disappointing results with Sodium Arsenite because of the cold weather. Some have mixed Sodium Arsenite with 2,4-D or 2,4,5-T with the latter giving the best results. When mixing these two chemicals it was suggeested that you should use them both at one pound per acre actual material. Paul Voykin mentioned that he had used Kuron last year with amazing results. Warren Bidwell of Olympia Fields Country Club is using a new product in this area called Endothol with fair results. It can be mixed with 2,4-D.

On some occasions there have been reports of burning if hot weather persisted for any length of time immediately after application of Endothol.

Q. I have a weed problem on my lake that I use for irrigation purposes. What material can be used so there will be no harm to my turf and still kill the weeds?

A. Al Johnson and Bert Rost have both used Sodium Arsenite at the recommended rates with good results. They reported no damage to the turf out on the course when the water was used for irrigation. They did recommend however, that you wait 72 hours after application before using the water for irrigation.

Q. Has anybody got something worth reporting on Wetting Agents?

A. There were no comments pro or con. The conclusion was made that the use of wetting agents in our area is negligible.

After the educational portion of the meeting we heard reports. Adolph Bertucci reported that as Chairman of the Benevolence Committee he was notified that Director Bill Brady has been ill. Also Al Purvey and Harold Reed have also been under the weather. We wish them all a speedy recovery.

Ted Woehrle reported that the last issue of the Bull Sheet was the largest issue ever printed. It contained 10 pages and many pictures. Woehrle explained the recent delays in receiving the Bull Sheet were due to the new method of mailing them by Bulk Mail. This process takes 5-15 days. We are saving over \$25.00 per month by mailing them by Bulk Mail as compared to First Class.

The next report was given by the Chairman of the Arrangements Committee, Al Johnson. He reported that the July meeting will be held at the McHenry Country Club. Harold Michels will be Host Superintendent.

PETER BILD FINISHES THE INSTALLATION OF THE NEW IRRIGATION SYSTEM AT GLEN FLORA

The installation consists of 25,000 feet of both transite and galvanized pipe and 267 sprinkler outlets. There are 19 sod cup outlets and 248 quick coupling valve outlets on the course. Control valves divide the system into five sections and the entire course can be watered in under 12 hours.

Work on the irrigation started late last summer and was completed late November.

According to the members at the club, Pete has done a terrific job in his short tenure at the club. Members unanimously agree that under his supervision the course has taken on added stature as a "truly championship layout," and they're proud in every way of their entire club structure.

DO YOU HAVE A WEED PROBLEM IN YOUR POND OR LAKE?

This office recently received some literature (upon request) from two chemical companies that manufacture chemical for the control of aquatic weeds. One of these chemicals is the well known Sodium Arsenite manufactured by the Chipman Chemical Company. The other is a relatively new product in our profession and that is Aquathol manufactured by the Pennsalt Chemicals Corporation.

Sodium Arsenite is available in the liquid form as well as the dry formulation. They are equally effective. The liquid is a little easier on the spraying equipment because it is not abrasive to the metal.

The United States Department of Interior recommends sodium arsenite for controlling certain submersed vegetation in farm ponds, hatchery ponds and small lakes. This chemical has been used for a number of years and results show that sodium arsenite is a cheap and most effective chemical for submersed weed control in STILL waters.

The liquid form of sodium arsenite is more effective for spraying in water because it does not have to dissolve like the dry formulation. One gallon contains 4 pounds of arsenic trioxide.

DOSAGES REQUIRED: In small lakes and ponds (2 acres and less) during the warm growing season, 4 parts arsenic trioxide per million parts of water will kill even the heaviest growth of plants in both hard and soft waters. If weeds are not too dense, 21/2 parts per million (ppm.) will generally give good results. Use 5 ppm. for lakes ranging from 2 to 10 arces in size, when treated in their entirety.

HOW TO CALCULATE VOLUME OF WA-TER AND CHEMICAL REQUIRED: Before making any treatment, it is necessary to know the cubic foct volume of water to be treated. The average length multiplied by the average width of the body of water





gives its surface area. This area multiplied by the average depth (obtained by soundings) gives the volume of water. For simplicity, measurements should be expressed in feet; then the volume of water calculated will be in cubic feet (water weighs 62.4 pounds per cubic foot). The following formula may be used to caluculate the quantity of chemical needed for each section of water to be treated:

No. cv. ft. water to be treated X 62.4 = lbs. arsenic trioxide X no. ppm. needed 1,000,000 needed to give 1 ppm. for treatment = lbs. arsenic trioxide needed -:- 4 = gals. Sodium Arsenite to use Example: Pond containing $\frac{64,080 \text{ cv. ft X } 62.4}{1,000,000}$ = 4 lbs. arsenic trioxide X 2½ ppm. = 10 lbs. arsenic trioxide needed :-: 4 = 2½ gals. of liquid Sodium Arsenite.





WHEN TO TREAT: For best results treat early in the growing season when plants are young and growing vigorously, and before they have reached the fruiting stage. Young plants absorb the chemical more readily and are most easily killed. This will also reduce the population of Oxygen depletion caused by decay of large masses of vegetation.

EFFECTS OF TREATMENT. There are no harmful affects to fish from the use of Sodium Arsenite as described, since higher concentrations or longer exposures are required to kill fish. Fish and some aquatic organisms are repelled by sodium arsenite and tend to move out of the treated areas.

The second chemical I wish to cover is Aquathol. I failed to mention earlier that there is also a product produced by Pennsalt Corp. called Aquathol Plus. Aquathol products used at recommended dosages kill certain undesirable submerged and emergent weeds without harm to fish. They both come in granular or liquid form. Each has been developed to give control of specific weed problems. These products have been thoroughly tested and registered with the United States

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7400 SOUTH MADISON STREET HINSDALE, ILLINOIS FA culty 3-7171 Department of Agriculture and comply with food and drug laws. Aquathol is a good aquatic weed killer for most submerged weeds. Treated water may be used for watering turf immediately. Water may be used for swimming and recreational purposes after 24 hours. After 7 days the water may be used for irrigation, agricultural sprays, watering of livestock and domestic purposes. The usual rate of application is 21/2 gallons of liquid or 50-100 pounds of granular per acre foot of water (one acre of water one foot deep).

Aquathol Plus kills a larger number of water weeds, including emergent weeds, in addition to submerged weeds. Some weeds are killed by contact action and some by systemic action. Weeds killed by systemic action die more slowly (2 to 4 weeks), consequently, all susceptible weeds will not disappear at the same time. Treated water may be used for swimming and recreational purposes after 24 hours; however, it should not be used for irrigation, agricultural sprays, turf watering, domestic water or watering livestock. The usual rate of application is 11/4 gallons of liquid or 50 pounds of granular per acre foot of water.







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
