
Please forgive my nagging to go out and that ridiculous suggestion about a weekend trip. It's so easy for me to forget how much can go wrong over a weekend.


# MANAGER-SUPERINTENDENT OUTING

# SUMMER PERSPECTIVE

#### May 25, 1966

What promised to be an early Spring and an early golf playing season, turned out to be a cold, wet and late season. In the last week of May, this weather pattern promises to reverse itself and we now predict a drier and warmer June, Bets are being taken at "Window #10."

During the last week of May, the grass was in an explosive condition with spring applications of fertilizer and too much water culminating in lush growth. With the advent of drier and warmer weather, a deterioration may set in in June, calling for a feeding with an organic fertilizer in conservative amounts. On irrigated turf, this will assure a more uniform turf condition during the summer. Some users prefer to make light applications monthly. On non-irrigated turf, an application of an organic feeding in June, will result in better and greener turf during July and August, when rainfall is expected to be at a minimum.

After consultation with Charles W. Wilson, Agronomist for Milorganite, who has conducted experiments for a number of years to establish the best times of the year and the number of times organic fertilizer applications are most effective, we find surprisingly one or two i.e. spring and/or fall applications show up real well, though many superintendents prefer a number of light applications during the summer months.

Labor continues to be the golf superintendent's number one problem. While this will be alleviated somewhat with the availability of college and high school students shortly, this does not solve the problem. It will be with the superintendents again after Labor Day. There is no indication of the tight labor situation being reversed. Unless the Viet Nam war is ended, factories producing for the Armed Services will out-bid civilian enterprises for labor.

The recent slump in the securities markets seems increases on all machinery for the next season. This is only a correction of over-population. We predict price again is essentially due to increased labor costs, taxes and overhead. Like with the weatherman, there should be a margin for mistakes. When a prognosticator is right, he points with pride; if he is wrong, he likes to forget. Therefore, take this information with the usual "two grains of salt."

# PLASTIC MULCH A SUCCESS AT BUTTERFIELD

Superintendent Bert Rost was forming ulcers on his ulcers this Spring because the wet Fall of 1965 had delayed construction of several new Ray Diddier designed greens and tees at Butterfield. Then, too, all of us know that Spring failed to spring with its customary vigor in Chicago this year.

Bert had to seed in early May and the members expect to play by July 4. From the looks of things, by late May the deadline will be met, thanks to a conversation that Bert had with the U.S.G.A.'s Jim Holmes. Jim suggested they try "Soil-Set," an elastomeric polymer concentrate dispersed in water as a liquid mulch to hold soil, seed and fertilizer in place.

#### Seedbed Preparation

Putting green seedbeds were prepared in the usual fashion. A 10-10-10 fertilizer at 20 pounds and Milorganite at 40 pounds were lightly tilled into the surface with Penncross bent at 3 pounds per 1,000 square feet. All new greens and tees were rimmed with bluegrass sod, and this may be one reason why the Soil-Set application was so successful. Certainly, it prevented the "undercutting" type of erosion from non-treated areas experienced by some who have used this material.


Soil-Set was then applied using the recommended 9 parts water to 1 part Soil-Set dilution at a cost of about \$3.00 per 1,000 square feet for the plastic mulch. The manufacturer, Alco Chemical Company, suggests waiting for 3 hours after the application before walking on or dragging hose over the newly seeded area. Bert feels that under his conditions a 12 hour wait was even better.

#### Love Those Check Plots

Fortunately for our knowledge Bert has small (about 2 square feet) check plots on each newly seeded area. These plots had everything but the Soil-Set and offer visual proof that the mulch really worked. In addition to stopping 90% or better of potential erosion, the Soil-Set brought about earlier seed germination. Bert feels it did this by holding the Milorganite in place. Shortly after seeding, a 3 inch plus gully washer of rain arrived at Butterfield. Within another week almost 2 more inches of rain fell in a short time. This washed fertilizer and seed from the non-treated check plots, but not where the liquid mulch had been applied.

Although no soil temperature measurements were made, Bert Rost is certain the black Milorganite granules absorbed some heat from the sun to bring about earlier soil warming and thus earlier germination. On the border where the Milorganite washed from the check plots more growth is evidenced to bear out Bert's contention.




#### PLASTIC MULCH (Continued)

Mr. Rost also found another advantage from the liquid mulch application. After the 3 to 12 hour waiting period one hand watering was all that was needed. Subsequent irrigations were made with large fairway sprinklers to save time and money.


The only erosion noticed was a few minor rivulets at the lower end of large and rather steeply pitched greens. Bert feels that possibly a double rate application under these conditions would have prevented any damage. In any event, Bert Rost is satisfied that for Spring seedings, Soil-Set is worthy of consideration. It definitely worked for him.



After 20 days pictures show increased growth in dark area with use of liquid mulch over area (lighter) where no mulch was applied.
