### **BURNING OK'D AFTER ANDREW** BATON ROUGE, La. - To ac-

commodate waste disposal needs of victims of Hurricane Andrew, Louisiana Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) secretary Kai Midboe has issued temporary variances to all affected parishes in the state, as well as potentially affected solid waste disposal facilities.

The variances allow for controlled, organized burning of Hurricane Andrew debris such as demolished buildings, leaves, limbs and other vegetable matter.

Items containing natural or synthetic rubber such as tires, heavy oils, hazardous substances, asbestos, shingles and other roofing materials may not be burned, nor may these substances be used to start a fire.
