Beer banned at Eagle Valley GC

CARSON CITY, Nev. - Rowdy out-of-town golfers who saddle their cars with cases of beer prompted the Board of Selectmen here to ban coolers from the municipal Eagle Valley Golf Course.

"The people that now bring alcohol on the course are a liability for both the city and the golf professional," Deputy City Manager Patrick Sorensen told the Carson City Nevada Appeal.

Pat Milligan, who manages the bar and grill for ARA Leisure Services, said most of the on-course problems are caused by out-of-town players, usually as part of a tournament. One weekend, 23 beer bottles were found on the course.

"And we don't sell bottles," she explained.

ARA Leisure Services has a written policy that forbids employees from serving intoxicated customers.

There is no ARA policy for drinking on the course.

Although ARA returns a percentage of all food and drink sales to the city, Sorensen said revenue considerations had nothing to do with the new ruling.
