*News.* His firm has built many golf courses that have been selected as the best courses by various rating systems. Many of these facilities are chosen as sites for PGA Tour and tournament events.

Some of the courses he has built or remodeled include Golf Club of Georgia (Lakeside Course), Alpharetta, Ga.; The Fortress, Frankenmuth, Mich.; University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wis.; Augusta National, Augusta, Ga.; Castle Pines, Castle Rock, Col.; Kiawah Island Resort (three courses), Charleston, S.C.; Eagle Ridge, Galena, Ill.; Troon Village, Scottsdale, Ariz.; Eagle Trace, Coral Springs, Fla.; Desert Mountain (three courses), Carefree, Ariz.; Tournament Players Club of Michigan, Dearborn, Mich.

### KEY LINK IN GROWTH PERIOD

"Wadsworth has been involved in one of the most dynamic growth periods in the history of golf course development in this country," said Hills. "Facilities are integral to the game of golf and it is through building them that he has made an outstanding contribution to the game."

Wadsworth, who grew up in Joliet, Ill., graduated from the School of Landscape Architecture at the University of Illinois. He then worked for a short time in the office of ASGCA founding member Robert Bruce Harris. Following service in the U.S. Air Force, he joined with ASGCA member Edward L. Packard in 1954 to form a golf course design firm known as Packard and Wadsworth.

In 1958, he established the Wadsworth Golf Construction Company to build courses because his interest in golf and course construction became more appealing than designing courses.

"There were too few persons specializing in golf course building at that time and even fewer that met my goals of creating superior facilities," said Wadsworth.

### FOUR REGIONAL OFFICES

His determined interest and ability to carry out a designer's desires has created a demand for his work. Most recently he was inducted into the Illinois PGA Hall of Fame for his efforts within the golf industry. Wadsworth's firm now has four regional offices, including Plainfield, Ill., Oldsmar, Fla., Buckeye, Ariz., and Honolulu, Hawaii. He and his wife Jean have four children, Leslie, Martha, Stanley and Eric.

In addition to building courses, he helped build and served as chairman of a major resort company that provided superior golf facilities to the travel industry. He also serves on several golf related advisory boards.

"Receiving the 1993 Donald Ross Award is an overwhelming thrill and a joy," said Wadsworth. "I'm honored to be recognized by so many of my colleagues and am proud to be associated with so many prominent former recipients."
