BUFFALO, N.Y. - Cazenovia Park golf course superintendent Gary Kelchin is racking up quite the inventory of vandalism incidents at his 18-hole course.

First there was the spraypainted Grateful Dead logos on the putting greens. Then there were the beer bottles pushed into the ground. And last September, obscene slogans were carved in

But the latest incident has been the most spectacular yet. Kelchin recently turned up to work on a Sunday to find a burned out 1987 Oldsmobile sitting in the middle of the course. The car had been stolen and driven all over the snow-covered fairways before being set afire. Kelchlin told the Buffalo News

snow mold.


Master plan could call for major changes at Illinois course

MAHOMET, Ill. - Champaign County Forest Preserve District officials will embark on a study this year that could lead to renovations and improvements to Lake of the Woods Golf Course.

The officials approved spending \$5,300 for aerial mapping of the golf course, the first step in creating a new master plan for the facility.

Late last year, the district hired architect William Spear of St. Charles to present it with concepts for improving Lake of the Woods. Spear worked with the original course designer, Robert Bruce Harris, in the 1940s and 1950s.

Forest Preserve Executive Director John Potts said some work could start this fall, but the district is looking at renovations as a long-term project to be implemented over several years. Some possible changes include reworked bunkers, enlarged greens, and new cart paths.
