

CHOPPED SHREDDED Versus LONG RUNNER STOLONS

We prefer chopped stolons rather than long runner stolons, although both are obtainable from us, for the following reasons:

1. You get more nodes per bushel.
2. Easier to spread while planting.
3. More even distribution.
4. A bushel will plant 100 square feet or more of area.
5. Saves 50% on topdressing. One cubic yard will cover a green of 5000 square feet. It takes two cubic yards with long stolons.
6. Does not need to be torn apart.
7. Stolons lay flatter on the ground.
8. Less chance for stolons to blow away while roots are anchoring.
9. Quicker maturity. A green is playable in seven or eight weeks.
10. No need of fuss with heavy steel mats.

PGA To Name Five As Tournament Sponsor Advisors

PGA Pres. Harold Sargent in a letter to Roger Hagel, Phoenix, Ariz., pres., International Golf Sponsors Assn., advised that the PGA would name a five-man advisory committee of tournament sponsors. The committee is to meet periodically with the entire membership of the PGA Tournament Committee to discuss policy, contracts and schedules.

The International Golf Sponsors Assn. had protested what they claimed was "taxation without representation" in financing and conducting tournaments and financing the PGA tournament bureau. The IGSA had asked for the formation of a 9-man policy board to include three members of the IGSA.

The PGA, under the proposed arrangement, is to appoint the members of the committee of sponsors.

Hagel has not indicated whether the PGA appointments rather than those of IGSA will be acceptable to the IGSA.
