Carr Gets Jones' Award; First Turf Citation to Monteith

Joseph B. Carr of Ireland became the first citizen of a foreign country to receive the USGA's Bob Jones award. It was made at the association's annual meeting held in late January in New York. The award, "for distinguished service in golf," was made by William Ward Forshay, chmn. of the Jones committee, and John G. Clock, who was elected to his second term as

USGA pres.

Carr, a 38-year old clothing manufacturer from Sutton, near Dublin, has been a leading British amateur player for several years. In 1960 he became the third man in history to win the British Amateur championship for the third time. He won the title for the first time in 1953 and repeated in 1958. Carr first came into prominence in 1946 when he won the Irish Open Amateur, a victory he repeated on three other occasions. Since 1947 he has been a member of every British Walker Cup team and he has played with Great Britain and Ireland in two World Amateur team championships.

Other Jones award winners have been Francis D. Ouimet, William C. Campbell, the late Mildred (Babe) Zaharias, Margaret Curtis, the late Findlay S. Douglas and

Charles (Chick) Evans.

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The first USGA green section turf award went to Dr. John Monteith, Jr., of Colorado Springs, Colo. It was presented by Clock and William C. Chapin, Rochester, N. Y., section chmn., at the education meeting of the green section, also held in late January.

On Air Academy Staff

Dr. Monteith, now on the staff of the Air Force Academy and a former employee of the Agriculture Dept., was in charge of the USGA green section's program of advisory and education service and research from 1928 to 1942. He developed the first effective chemical control of several destructive turf diseases and the remedies still are widely used. He also supervised research programs on grasses that still are in general use — Merion blue and the Arlington, Congressional, Cohansey and Toronto strains of creeping bent.

Dr. Monteith received his B. S. and Masters degrees at Rutgers University and Ph. D. from the University of Wisconsin. In World War II received a "meritorious civilian service" award from the War Dept. for his work in erosion and dust control at airfields and other army installations.

1963 Open at Brookline

Country Club of Brookline, Mass., will be the site of the 1963 USGA Open. It will be played June 20-23. The tournament will coincide with the 50th anniversary of one of golf's most memorable events, Francis Ouimet's victory in the 1913 Open, also played at Brookline. The Country Club, one of the five charter members in the USGA, has been the site of seven other USGA Championships as well as the 1932 Walker Cup competition.
