

Stranahan honored

Northern Ohio PGA honored with a golf day and dinner, the first of the millionaire golf professionals, Frank Stranahan. Frank won 60 tournaments as amateur and pro. but never won the U.S. Amateur. He lost in 39 holes in 1950 National Amateur at Minneapolis GC to Sam Urzetta, who has become one of our admirable pros. In the first round Frankie beat Arnold Palmer. 4 and 3, and Palmer has become a well-known professional, as has Freddie Wampler, who fell to Stranahan, 4 and 3. Frankie beat Jim McHale 1 up (and Jim became a pro). Others in that field who turned pro: Mac Hunter, Al Mengert, Bud Holscher, Gus Moreland, Mason Rudolph, Tom Veech, Dow Finsterwald and Billy Maxwell. So what's new about good amateurs turning pros?

Frank won the British Amateur in 1948 and 1950, the Western Amateur four times, was a stroke back of the winner in the 1947 British Open and was high amateur in British and U.S. Opens several times.

Frank won the Los Angeles Open in 1958. He won seven Tour tournaments and was second in 20. Glory fades fast and so does memory, so not many will recall that Frankie, yesteryear was rapped on account of being born, as Tom Loomis of the Toledo Blade said "with a silver seven-iron in his mouth."

Royalty payments on clubs and balls to estates of **Walter Hagen** and **Tommy Armour** make one wonder how long the commercial value of present pro stars' names will last. Hagen's last major title win was the 1932 Western Open; Armour's last big win was the 1934 British Open. Neither The Haig nor the Silver Scot got the highpowered exploitation pro athletes get today.

Generally, "ladies' tees" are merely areas set ahead to shorten the course, but in the past few years ingenious architects have located ladies' tees where there is less demand for distance, but more interesting design variations from the playing requirements of men's tees. These testing shorter layouts call for some other name than "ladies' tees," because sometimes they're more enjoyable for men than the "mileage" holes designed for longhitting tourney specialists.

Ted Anderson retires as superintendent at Ellinwood CC, Athol, Mass., after 39 years with the club. For a few years prior to going to Ellinwood Ted was with his brother Arthur at Alpine GC, Fitchburg, Mass. Ken Mildren is Anderson's successor at Ellinwood. The club retains Anderson as a consultant, which is a smart arrangement all around. Ellinwood was a ninehole rock-spotted pasture when Anderson came. Athol municipality took over the course during the Depression for \$1 a year and Anderson was supplied with Works Progress Administration (WPA) labor that enabled him to transform the course. Now it's an 18-hole layout in fine condition.

This summer University of Maryland and superintendents in Mid-Atlantic GCSA territory are cooperating in a work-study program that promises to provide many of the right answers to the labor and educational requirements of course management and make available valuable summer work and schooling for the class of young talent golf needs. **G.D.
