Environmental Friend or Foe?

More avid golfers believe that golf courses are not environmental threats, according to the National Golf Foundation. According to NGF's recent study, Avid Golfer Attitudes and Perceptions:

80 percent of golfers say that golf courses are good for the environment, compared to 78 percent of golfers who were surveyed in 1996.

85 percent of golfers say golf courses are more environmentally friendly today than they were 10 years ago compared to 77 percent in 1996.

Women and Golf
