# What About Winter Turf Injury?

I am sure that if you are truthful with yourself you are not sure that your golf course is going into the winter fully protected or that it is ready for winter. Some questions are: are the greens cut too short or not short enough, or did the greens get enough water, or are the aerifier holes sufficiently closed so that dessication does not take place, did the snow mold protection you put on adequately cover the area that you wanted to cover, and what will the damage be from snow mobiles, toboggans etc.? All of these questions you might have or some one else might also want to ask them. Certainly no one person knows all the answers, and if he does he is in the wrong business. No one should go away from this symposium with unanswered questions. This could easily be the most opportunistic time you will ever have to learn the complete story on winter injury.

This should be an informative program. The people with the greatest amount of knowledge (practical, educational, hypothetical) are going to be on the panel. If these people can not answer your questions, it could just be that no one can.

You notice that I keep mentioning questions. This is particularly important at any conference, but specifically at a symposium, which is a detailed analysis of one subject. It follows then that the program is one which requires your attention and your questions.

The program or symposium is an innovation. The WGCSA along with the (continued on page 3)

Dear Mr. Miller:

The members of the Wisconsin Turf Conference Planning Committee appreciate your calling to our attention the Symposium on Winter Injury to Turf to be held in Milwaukee this December 14 and 15. You have made a good effort in drawing together what appears to be an excellent program, and we certainly want to wish the Wisconsin Golf Course Superintendents Association the best of success with this new venture.

The goals of your Symposium Committee are obviously the same as that which the Wisconsin Conference Committee has attempted to follow in past years, namely to encourage turf care and management in Wisconsin to its most competent level, and to underwrite this effort with a level of knowledge, understanding and enthusiasm for turf work that will force this competency to greater levels each year. Since we both have the same objectives, we feel that it would be most appropriate for us to endorse your Symposium, give it our support, and cancel plans for a turf conference in 1967. Several of us hope to be in attendance at the Winter Injury Symposium. If there is any way that we can be of assistance to you as you may attempt further Symposia in the future, please understand that we will be happy to do so.

In order still to provide an opportunity for training to turf people in the state who are not associated with golf course management the committee is tentatively planing a series of four workshops to be offered in the state, probably during the first week of April. These workshops will be co-sponsored by mem-



bers of the Departments of Agronomy, Entomology, Horticulture, Plant Pathology, and Soils, and will relate to basic training in such areas as turf grass identification and the like. No out of state speakers will participate in these meetings. Golf course superintendents would be welcome to attend, of course, if they should desire, but the emphasis will be on blue grass care rather than bents or greens.

We would appreciate it if you would convey our best wishes to your committee, and we hope to see you at the Symposium December 14 and 15.
