It has occurred to me and to others of you that our organization could benifit from an official publication. Several years ago a news letter was published by this organization. However for a variety of reasons it was discontinued.

After talking to several of our members about the possibility of establishing another news letter, I investigated the mechanics and the cost of developing a publication.

This sample news letter was printed by Insty-Prints, Inc. They offer economical offset printing. With their process it is possible to use a wide variety of information sources. Articles contributed by members or lay-outs from commercial supporters can be fastened directly to the master copy without any special process or retyping, etc.. Articles can be transferred directly from magazines or newspapers. All sorts of typed, hand written or drawings can be used with few exceptions. Even black and white pictures taken by members can be used with no special preparation. As you can see this process would give much leeway in the preparation of such a news letter.

The following types of information could be included in a news letter.

Articles of interest from other publications. Contributions from association members. Contributions from interested persons. Pictures and snapshots of interest. Important business from previous metting. Subjects to be discussed in upcomming meetings. Golf Scores and boogy winners. Information on the course to be played the comming month. Want ads - free service to members. Ads from commercial supporters. Jokes and cartoons. Other information of interest.

It is my thought that a news letter of this type would help inform and educate our association membership and stimulate greater interest in the association, the meetings it sponsers and in quality turf. The following are some of the writting instruments that may be used and the results that can be expected from them.

### EDITORIAL

SO — you missed the superintendents meeting:
