This past winter was extremely hard on a number of courses this winter. The Fox Valley and Madison area seemed by far the hardest hit. Most of the damage was caused by ice selecting not only *Poa annua*, but also some bentgrass. The cool weather of mid May didn't help matters either. A lot of damage was slow to fill back in, and many superintendents who pregermented bentgrass, still were waiting for it to grow in.

After visiting many damaged courses, it is hard not to become sympathetic to each superintendent's personal situation. It's not that there isn't concern or remorse about their situation, but going into these areas and seeing most of the courses with some lost turf, it becomes almost too routine. One blessing is that misery loves company, and knowing that in most cases your neighbor wasn't excluded from nature's wrath helps somewhat in easing the trauma of dead turf.

Recently, I stopped at Butte des Morts in Appleton, to review the horrible damage that Steve Schmidt said he had on his course. Talk about a superintendent who is blowing smoke; his damage was minute compared to other courses down in Oshkosh. Of course, even a 1% loss of turf on greens can be considered unacceptable, but in a year that some consider the worst ice damage in 35 years, only a small loss may be a blessing. Think of it as nature's own "Growth Regulator".

Not everyone lost turf; other areas of the state came out in great shape! The Milwaukee and Stevens Point/ Wausau area missed most of the ice damage. For those of you who looked great coming out of winter, mark it down as your turn for good luck.

While a number of superintendents worried about how much damage they would have, Roy Zehren of Natural Athletic Turf was down in Ft. Walton Beach, Florida playing golf. On March 14th, Roy shot his first hole-in-one at the Ft. Walton Municipal Golf Course. He used an 8 iron on a 138 yard Par 3 hole, and the ball bounced twice and dropped in. The personnel changes continue throughout Wisconsin this spring.
