EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK




If you have any trees that look like this 15' Norway Spruce the damage is likely from Imprellis herbicide. The new product from DuPont worked great on weeds but has caused significant damage to White Pine and Norway Spruce but also many other evergreen trees.

Damage has also been reported on some deciduous trees. Your first step is to call DuPont at 866-796-4783 to start the claims resolution process. Shortly after that a team will visit your golf course to evaluate and document your damage. It is important to start the process soon and be sure you do not sign any settlements with DuPont or a third party.

There are a number of law firms trying to latch onto the Imprellis refund process so proceed cautiously.

Our site visit was last week with 17 trees documented. They were

mainly Norway Spruce but one Blue Spruce and three Honey Locusts that turned color and lost it's leaves on half the branches in late July. DuPont has stopped selling the product and will begin a return and refund process soon. The official Imprellis website is http:// www.imprelis-facts.com/.
