FRANK MUSBACH 1901-1988

Frank Musbach, Class AA, Life member of the Wisconsin Golf Course Superintendents Association, passed away July 3, 1988 at the age of 86 of cancer. Mr. Musbach was superintendent at Blue Mound Golf and Country Club, Wauwatosa, Wisconsin for 34 years, 1944 thru 1978, when he retired. Frank was born in Grafton, Wisconsin, in 1901, worked and became horse team straw boss at Ozaukee Country Club, Mequon, Wisconsin through its construction. Frank then became the golf course superintendent at Ozaukee Country Club until 1944 when he moved to Blue Mound. Frank fathered and grandfathered golf superintendents in his son Bob Musbach, presently at North Hills Country Club, Menomonee Falls, Wisconsin, and Bob's son, Dean Musbach, superintendent at Timber Ridge Country Club, Minocqua, Wisconsin.

Frank was a past president of the WGCSA (1958 and 1959) and served on its board for many years. He was very active in association affairs and regional conferences of which he attended many, Purdue University's Conference in particular.

Frank's life was devoted to turf management. In fact, it was his hobby. Many of us spent time listening to Frank's facts and theories about golf course maintenance and construction practices during its infancy. Thank you, Frank. You will long be remembered.

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NOER CENTER MOVED

There is some good news about the NOER CENTER. For reasons not completely clear to this editor, local government officials wanted the entrance to the University of Wisconsin golf course moved to a location that would have split the proposed research facility. Obviously this was unacceptable, so on July 7 a meeting was held among the University of Wisconsin faculty, the directors of the Wisconsin Turfgrass Association, officials from the University's Department of Planning and Construction, and staff from the new University of Wisconsin golf course. The purpose of the meeting was to find a new location for the NOER CENTER on the property owned by the University of Wisconsin Foundation that includes the new golf course. As a result of the meeting, the NOER CENTER will now be built on the very northeast corner of the property, at the intersection of Junction Road and Midtown Road.

The hope was that the new site would be as good as the previous one. In reality, it represents a considerable improvement! There is plenty of room, the soils are good, the site is naturally drained, it is accessible by virtue of its location on main roads, and has a natural setting for the building and a parking lot. It met the high standards of evervone there at the meeting, and left them with a great sense of satisfaction that the matter is settled.

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
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Casey Suit to be Appealed

On Monday, June 27th, the Citizens Advisory Committee to the office of Wisconsin Public Intervenor directed Tom Dawson to appeal the Washburn County Circuit Court order which declared the Town of Casey Pesticide Ordinance "void, invalid and of no effect". (At the time this newsletter is being written the appeal has not been filed, but the Public Intervenor in a conversation on July 25th stated that he expected the filing would take place in a few days.)

This decision is not too surprising. The Public Intervenor had stated, when the County Forest Administrator of Washburn County challenged an earlier Casey ordinance, that he would support the Casey law. Also the current attorney for the Town, Linda Monroe, was a member of the Public Intervenor's staff and drafted the various

pesticide ordinances which were adopted by the Town of Casey in 1983, 1984 and 1985.

The Town of Casey had voted on June 14th to appeal the Court's decision. They were hoping that the Public Intervenor's office would support the appeal since then the only cost to the town would be the \$160 filing fee. Now the appeal briefs and arguments will be prepared at state taxpayers' expense by the Public Intervenor's office.

We had written both the Attorney General and the PI's Committee questioning the wisdom of continuing state involvement and costs on this particular case. Ms. Monroe, the town's attorney, requested an opportunity to appear before the PI's Advisory Committee to present their position.

The points we made were that the Washburn County ruling stated it was

the intent of Congress that FIFRA preempt and prohibit regulation of pesticides by local governments; that it was the Legislative intent, and that state law also preempted local pesticide regulations; and that the Casey Ordinance conflicts with Federal and State law and regulation. (Support of any one of the above conclusions would void the ordinance.)

We further cited the Court's statement that this case was decided on purely legal grounds, and noted that recent appeals of similar cases in Maryland, Illinois, Massachusetts and New Hampshire all reached the same conclusion as did Washburn County Circuit Judge Bailey. Our arguments were not successful and those of you who are Wisconsin residents will be footing the bill for this appeal.



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
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
