So keep your fingers crossed and look forward to Dr. Julie Meyer's snowmold trial results.

The Northern Great Lakes Golf Course Superintendents Association held their 5th annual Turfgrass Symposium on March 7th at the Rhinelander Holiday Inn. The Symposium was titled "Staff, Management and Motivation," and had over 90 people in attendance.
