For those of you who may have met Bruce Knickel of Campbellsport through the years, I am sad to report that he died on Monday, February 3.

Bruce built and owned Indian Trails Golf Course in Campbellsport on the property he used to farm. He started out with a green and then a couple of par 3's and then slowly built it up until he had 18 holes with elevated tees and par fours and fives. At 81 years old he still did a majority of the work himself. I have ground greensmower reels for Bruce for a number of years, although he did his own gang reels. He said he did not trust himself with the greens reels.

Indian Trails is a private course for Bruce's friends and he charges no fees. He did use the barter system and traded tee signs and scorecards for play. He once told me he did not want to charge because he would have to follow the government's rules, not his own. He allowed the Campbellsport High School Golf Team to practice there since the course is across the street from the high school.

Never one to complain, Bruce has been battling

congestive heart failure for nine years. I last saw him in December and did not know. The medicines could not keep him going anymore, according to his son Steve.

Bruce was one of those grandfather figures you just wished would live forever. He always had a smile and a positive attitude. And from his hobby, you can tell he loved the game of golf and the career we all make our living from.

I think Bruce lived a life many of us dream about build 18 holes for family and friends so that while you are pulling that gang mower, everyone knows your name and gives you a wave.

And so we close for another issue. I'll end by sending my "thank you" to our volunteer writers, our advertisers, our printer, and to Dave Brandenburg. *The Grass Roots* was selected for "Best" in its category in the 2002 GCSAA chapter publications contest. The Grass Roots is done for the right reasons, and the recognition for that is always nice. And what a terrific way The Grass Roots is to record, for all time, our history. It warms the cockles of the heart of the chapter historian.

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# Impressive EXPO — But Where Were the Crowds?

The Wisconsin Turfgrass and Greenscape EXPO 2003 was held January 6, 7, and 8th, much to the fanfare of all in attendance. The only problem was not many attended. What a difference a year makes! Last year's attendance set the record, but this year's numbers were down by more than 1/3. Only 278 attendees passed through the doors this year compared to 415 last year. Is it the economy? Is it something with the show? Are there conflicts with other state and local shows? I heard lots of good comments from attendees about the education, so it must be the economy and conflicts with other shows. There has to be a way to bring the people back. The EXPO planning committee will meet soon and will be "thinking outside the box" to make big plans for next year's show to bring the people back.

The planning committee, led by WTA vice-president Rich Riggs, is inspired to keep EXPO as the show of shows for you every year. The university and industry representatives on the committee are likewise dedicated to keeping the show top-notch. A questionnaire is being sent out to get attendee and exhibitor feedback on what they would like to see at future shows. The committee would like to hear your input. It's your chance to tailor the education for your benefit.

The trade show actually increased in size this year over last year. The vendors do so much to make EXPO well-rounded and interesting. They likewise help to support the education so please show them your gratitude and purchase from them throughout the year. The list of 2003 EXPO exhibitors with short company descriptions is listed on a following page. The trade show hours also increased for 2003, so if shopping for services or products was what you wanted, then EXPO was for you.

The education was likewise excellent. EXPO started out with several half-day workshops that



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delved into topics like learning Spanish, maintaining equipment, becoming a certified and environmentally friendly facility, and pesticide applicator training. The workshops cost an extra fee above the regular conference package, but the added detail was worth it to many attendees.

The next two days were full of all kinds of information. There was an opening session, a huge trade show, and numerous educational presentations. The presentations had great information for everyone in the green industry including those in the golf, lawn and landscape, and sports turf industries.

The opening session had a theme of safety in the workplace. Mark Purschwitz, from the University of Wisconsin-Madison Department of Biological Systems Engineering, led off the session. He discussed how to get started and ways to achieve a better workplace safety program, which included establishing a safety committee and training program. You follow that with a monitoring of the workplace for hazards, evaluating and prioritizing those hazards, establishing corrective measures, and monitoring the situation. Then he gave lots of information on when and how to train employees. For those of you who missed Mark's presentation, he said that you can get more information of safety by visiting the website - www.osha.gov or by calling 1-800-522-7448 and ordering the training manual "Safety Management for Landscapers."

Mark's talk led perfectly into the keynote presentation delivered by Richard Kithil from the National Lightning Safety Institute. He gave the audience many life-saving lightning safety guidelines to put into practice immediately this spring. Some of the guidelines are well known, yet others are not. The well known rules are that during a lightning storm one should avoid high ground, tall trees, metallic objects, water, and machinery. One rule that caught the audience by surprise was that small shelters, even with lightning rods attached, are one of the worst places to be in a lightning storm. Another rule of lightning safety that has been adopted by such prominent associations as the NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association), NATA (National Athletic Trainers Association) and the AMS (American Meteorological Society) is the 30/30 rule. This rule states that you, your crew, and clients should go to a safe shelter if the time between lightning and thunder is 30 seconds or less. Then stay there 30 minutes after the last rumble of thunder. Or





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Richard said you can think of it this way, "If you can see it (lightning), flee it; if you can hear it (thunder), clear it." He gave a couple websites to visit if you would like to see more of his and other organizations' safety tips for lightning. Those are www.lightningsafety.com and www.lightningsafety.noaa.gov.

Following opening session was the start of the trade show, and then came the awards and scholarship banquet. WTA president Dan Barrett started the banquet with the announcement of some big changes that will occur in the University's Turf Diagnostic Lab. He was proud to assure all clients of the lab that only the best and most prompt service will be given to each and every turf sample that is sent to the TDL in 2003. Awards and scholarships were handed out next. The list of UW-Madison turf student scholarship recipients is listed below. Also listed on page 58, are companies or individuals that gave turf research money to the WTA in 2002.

The educational presentations started in the afternoon and continued all day Wednesday. The golf course session was especially strong this year.
