lunch room or at your house.

Currently only about 8% of the private sector (non municipal) workforce is unionized. Recent Congressional Studies have predicted card check will increase union membership by 1.5 million workers but it will also eliminate 600,000 existing jobs.

Under the proposed legislation employers have 120 days after the 50.1% is reached to come to a collective bargaining agreement with the new union. If that agreement is not reached, a federal arbitrator will come in and write a binding contract that will cover the first two years.

Regardless if you are for or against this or any legislation it reminds of us of the importance of keeping our ears to the ground about changes the affect our operations while keeping in touch with our elected officials.

One tip I have from working in the

public sector would be to keep any arguments with your elected official's fact driven and not emotional. Emotion may work at a local level but at the state and federal level facts and concise arguments carry the day.



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# June 15th Meeting at South Hills CC in Fond Du Lac, WI

Ceasonable weather and sunny Oskies welcomed 67 attendees to the June meeting held at South Hills CC. Host Superintendent Jim Vanherwynen, CGCS a 20 year WGCSA member and the staff at South Hills welcomed members to the storied club which has undergone major improvements to the clubhouse and practice facility the last two seasons. The golf course was in great shape despite the uncooperative and very wet weather in the area. The course is set on 164 acres of rolling hills with the DeNeveau Creek coming into play a couple times.

The links opened in 1927, built by landowner Mr. A.D. Filiatrault with the help of his farmhands Bill Mullen and Elmer Burleton to the layout still played today. The course was first named Takodah meaning "welcome" after a contest was run in the local newspaper and won by local resident Mary Dana. Filiatrault sold the course in 1951 to Fred Thiel and Nate Manis who then owned the Riverdale Golf Course in Sheboygan for \$77,000. Soon after that a group of residents suggested the club be sold back to become a private club called South Hills Club. The name expanded to South Hills Golf and Country Club in 1986 when the membership voted to become a equity club.

The meeting began with a presentation by Aaron Hobbs of RISE. The Responsible Industry for a Sound Environment is a trade association representing manufacturers, formulators, distributors and other industry leaders involved with specialty pesticide and fertilizer products based out of Washington DC. Mr. Hobbs explained the mission of RISE is to

advocate for responsible use of pesticides at the federal, state and local levels. They stress that communication and proper use are extremely beneficial to our lives and quality of life. They strive to protect the use of pesticides by responsible and professional users. Mr. Hobbs stated that the current political climate in Washington has allowed other organizations with other agendas to pose a threat to pesticide use.

The presentation centered on the significant shift of the current congress focusing on economical issues along with a shift to environmental awareness and anti-pesticide sentiment has made their cause more important than ever at protecting sound, safe pesticide use. He stated several specific cases where RISE is litigating on the industries behalf trying to maintain current regulations.

Mr. Hobbs stated that RISE encompasses manufacturers, users, and professional associa-

tions such as GCSAA and WGCSA in protecting pesticide use. He stated that we need to be aware of all efforts that threaten our use of pesticides. He suggested that we utilize our networking and information sharing to communicate to legislature, public, and special interest

groups. RISE is implementing a National Grassroots Campaign that will be involved at all levels of government in the months to come. Mr. Hobbs presentation was educational and a reminder that many people are working hard on our industry's behalf in Washington as well as in WI.

After a great day on the golf course we gathered in the clubhouse for refreshments, passed hors de oeurves and awards. 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


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
