

For those of you who did not have a chance to watch the exit polls on CNN the night of the Wisconsin spring election I did manage to win a seat on our local village board. So far it has been an enjoyable eye opening experience as I learn the many different facets of a small village.

You quickly gain a lot of respect for the employees we have and the many jobs the Village Clerk, Director of Public Works and Police Chief have to do as they keep an eye on the village and it's concerns. Even though it is a small community we have the same tasks and responsibilities of a large city, only without the staff.

I have been appointed to the Public Works Committee and have been named Weed Commissioner. I first thought that was due to my agronomic background and considered it an honor. I was quickly brought back to earth when I realized it's the job the give the "newbie" on the board. When the village receives a complaint about a property not keeping the lawn mowed my job is to do an inspection and decide if the lawn is over 6".

If the lawn is over 6"tall I alert the village clerk to send the resident a letter of notice to mow the lawn in 5 days or have it mowed by village staff at the homeowner's expense. At least I don't have to mow the lawns!

How did your facility fair in 2009? The warm fall gave some Wisconsin operators needed rounds and revenues to get through the winter. Year end numbers for the United States from Golf Datatech showed rounds were down by less than 1% which is considered a victory considering how the recession has affected other industries.

However, revenue was down nearly 6% as more rounds were sold at a discount in order to attract customers. Unfortunately all this happened as our prices continue to increase causing many operators to cut budgets and try to do more with less once again.

More courses closed nationwide than opened for the 3rd year in a row which is a good thing unless you worked at one of the closed courses. Industry estimates are that up to 1,000 more courses may close in the next 5 years. There is no easy answer to the problems the golf industry is facing. Counting on early springs and rain only at night is not a feasible business plan.


Hopefully with proper planning and implementation we can make it through this challenge with better skills and the respect of our customers.



Distinguished Turfgrass Entomologists Remembered

Dr. R. Chris Williamson, Department of Entomology, University of Wisconsin - Madison

Within the past year, the turfgrass industry has experienced the loss of two highly influential and distinguished turfgrass entomologists, colleagues and friends. Drs. Paul Heller (Professor, Penn State University) and Haruo Tashiro (Professor Emeritus, Cornell University) were two of the early entomologists to do research as well as provide relevant extension information on insects and mites in the turf system. Their work has profoundly influenced the turf industry, and they helped pave the way for the turfgrass entomologists of today.

Paul Heller, known also as "Big Bug" by his students and friends, was the epitome of a mentor and advisor to students as well as his numerous industry constituents. He had a tremendous influence in many of his student's lives and career paths. Paul constantly and selflessly strived to improve his classes for the benefit of his students. He was instrumental in the creation and teaching of his Penn State World Campus on-line classes. Paul's work with golf course superintendents and other industry stakeholders was something he thoroughly enjoyed, becoming friends with many of them over the years. Another aspect of Paul's life and influence is his involvement at the local Christian radio station in State College, WTLR, where he was most affectionately known by his listeners as "Uncle Paul." Likely one of Paul's greatest gifts was the support and uncanny intuition he was always ready to share. Above all, Paul was generous with all his resources and nearly always placed others first. Paul is and will be greatly missed by all, especially his number one fan, his wife June.

Haruo Tashiro, most affectionately known as "Tash" by many of his friends and colleagues, was a world leader in the biology and management of insects and mites on turfgrass and woody ornamentals. Throughout Tash's scientific career, he produced numerous publications on the biology, ecology and management of insects affecting horticultural crops and turfgrass. Tash is probably best known for his 1987 publication, Turfgrass Insects of the United States and Canada. This widely used text book was the first comprehensive reference to bring together a discussion of practically all insects and other arthropods destructive to turfgrass. Tash was not only an excellent scientist but an accomplished artist. His detailed drawings of anatomical features of insects. his skill in cartography and his photographs are numerous in his text book. Tash will always be remembered as a gentleman, excellent scientist and an inspiration to his family and friends.

Despite their passing, Drs. Heller and Tashiro will continue to remain iconic pillars in the turfgrass community, especially to those who personally knew, were directly influenced, or may have utilized one or more of their turfgrass insect management recommendations. May the both rest in peace.



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
