Losses in the Industry -

Oliver F. Vogel the Founder of Spring Valley Turf of West Bend passed away on August 13, 2012 at the age of 88.

Oliver is survived by his loving wife of 65 years, Betty and four children, Kathleen (Gerald) Barbian, Laurie (Alan) Aleksandrowicz, William (Joyce) Vogel and Randall (Susan) Vogel; grandchildren Brian Barbian, Michael Aleksandrowicz, Elizabeth (James) Stamatokos, John (Jennie) Aleksandrowicz, Lawrence (Sara) Vogel, Julie (Paul) Fagley, Daniel Vogel, Oliver R. Vogel, Alexander (Elizabeth) Vogel, Abigail Vogel; six great-grandchildren and other relatives and friends.

He was a lifetime member of David's Star Evangelical Lutheran Church and a past member of the church council. He started the Cedar Valley 4-H Club which later became the Kirchhayn Trotters 4-H Club. He also started the Dairyland Softball League.

After his barn was struck by lighting and killed most of his milk cows in April 1954, Oliver started Vogel Seed & Fertilizer (now known as Spring Valley Turf). He was President for 35 years.

He was a member of the past Jackson Business Association. In 1970, Oliver was appointed a Director of the Jackson State Bank and also became a Director of the Fertilizer Association. In 1976, he was a member of the MATC Advisory Committee. Oliver received the Wisconsin Ag. Dealer of the Year Award in 1988. He was a member of the Town of Jackson Planning Commission for 22 years and also served as Chairman on the Board of Appeals. Oliver helped start the Jackson Senior Citizens organization.

The national turf industry was surprised by the passing of USGA Agronomist Stanley J Zontek on August 28, 2012 from a heart attack.

Zontek joined the USGA in 1971 and was the associations most tenured employee. With 41 years of golf course visits, published articles and speaking engagements Zontek has made friends all over the world.

Stanley's introduction to golf was raking

bunkers for his golf course superintendent father for \$1.10 per hour. His fathers course installed the first 'Penncross' bentgrass putting green in West Virginia.

After high school his interest in turfgrass science led him to enroll at Penn State. He started his USGA career as an agronomist in the Northeastern Region in 1971. He moved to our North Central Region (Now the Great Lakes Region) in 1980 before becoming the director of the Mid-Atlantic Region in 1985.

While in our region Zontek was a contributor to *The Grass Roots* penning a column called 'From The Directors Desk'. In the November issue of *The Grass Roots* Zontek was awarded the best quote at the 1990 Wisconsin Golf Turf Symposium with the following statement while discussing the most indispensable manager of a golf club. "Golf is played on grass, not on a hamburger or on a Izod shirt".

Stanley was a true friend of the golf course superintendent and was awarded the Distinguished Service Award from the Golf Course Superintendents Association, the Don A Rossi Award from the Golf Course Builders Association of America and the 2007 Crop and Soil Sciences Outstanding Alumni Award from his alma mater Penn State.

Along with helping thousands of golf courses provide better conditions for daily play or national tournaments Zontek also helped maintain the putting green at the White House.

He will be missed by turf enthusiasts everywhere.

Weather Extremes

This summer can be called anything but normal with the nicest spring weather in years followed by heat and drought for most of the state in June and July. They say politics and weather are local and that was proven this year as the rain was hit and miss through most of July but overall it was dry through most of the state.


In Fond du Lac our average high in July was 90.5 with a average low of 67.5.

The heat alone would not have been so bad but with high evapotranspiration rates irrigation systems and water supplies were taxed to the limit or over the limit as some courses had to reduce irrigated acres. From June 19 to July 25th our course had .55" of rain with a total ET rate of 6.22.

Here are the ugly numbers from the United States Department of Agriculture National Agricultural Statistics Service *Wisconsin Crop Progress* report.

In seasons or periods like this we find every weakness in water supplies, pumpstation output and sprinkler head efficiency. The positives to come out of a stressful summer are golf course manager know where they can improve their irrigation systems in the future or it if is time to drill a new well or rehab a old well.


The other positive is most golf courses are doing fairly well with rounds and revenues with few actual rainouts. For us play was

There are some welcome changes coming to the GCSAA golf tournament. The other major change is to shorten the time away from home and work by having the championship on Monday and Tuesday. This will mean attendees will have to choose between golf and seminars on those days but can still attend seminars on


