

# May Meeting at Trappers Turn Golf Club

Tod Blankenship, CGCS was our host for the May Meeting held May 14th at the Trappers Turn Golf Course. The day was beautiful and a good number of members turned out to enjoy it.

Our first speaker for the day was Mr. Seamus McGee author of the book "Hershey Hurricane" which celebrates the life of Henry Picard.

Picard is not known as the greatest player of the 1930's and 1940's but he had 26 PGA Tour wins including the 1938 Masters and 1939 PGA Championship. He was a near unbeatable fourball player and he often teamed up with Wisconsin's Johnny Revolta.

Picard was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame in 2006 and played in the 1935 and 1937 Ryder Cup Teams. Like most players of the time his career was interrupted by World War II.

Seamus explained how Henry has touched the games and lives of many of the great players of his time including helping Hogan with his swing and later taking over for Picard as Golf Professional at the Hershey Country Club.

Henry was given the name The Hershey Hurricane in 1935 due to his dominate play and movie star persona.

McGee explained how sound swing principals taught by Alex Morrison the "grandfather of the teaching professional" changed the game and produced great champions from Picard, to Hogan to Nicklaus.

Morrison taught Picard who taught Grout who was Nicklaus's coach and mentor.

The book is a nice read on golf history I would recommend for anyone in the business.

Next up was Robert Vavrek, Senior Agronomist, USGA Green Section discussing the roller coaster of spring weather.

Vavrek discussed how the up and down weather was changing the phenology of insects and plants and how historical dates for the timing of grub and poa seeding treatments should not be followed religiously. Higher populations of insects and poa annua seed heads should be expected.

Growing degree models, historical data and in the field observations should all be used to determine treatment times.

Vavrek also discussed the number of foreclosed golf courses and one visit he had where new owners were hoping to "flip" the property by getting in operational and then selling it. They wanted Bob's opinion on what needed to be down to get the previously closed course up and running.

After a lunch the group headed out to test our skills on Trappers Canyon and Arbor 9's. Trappers turn was designed by Andy North and Roger Packard in 1991.

The course was in great condition and all players had a great but challenging time. The format was a Shamble Bestball where both partners tee off, select the best drive and then play their own ball from that spot.

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# State Amateur Visits The Club at Strawberry Creek

The 111th Wisconsin State Golf Association State Amateur Championship will visit Kenosha's The Club at Strawberry Creek July 16 to 19. Matt Kregel will be the host superintendent for the states best players.

The Club At Strawberry Creek opened in 2006 with a Rick Jacobsen design. The links layout features fescue native grasses and wide fairways. The Par 72 layout offers yardages from 5,100 to 7,118 and the back tees have a slope of 135 and rating of 74.8.

Kregel took over as superintendent in spring of 2005 to oversee construction and grow-in. The open layout lends itself to high winds making it difficult to maintain soil moisture levels and to find a good time to apply pesticides and fertilizers.

Matt is hoping the wind is blowing for the Amateur to produce firm and fast conditions.

The 50 acres of fairways were seeded to Seaside II, greens A1, tees Pencross and while the primary rough is Bluegrass the Secondary rough is Fescue and other natives.

Matt gives credit to Assistant Superintendent Jeremy Dahl and Equipment Technician Gumer Cruz as key members of his staff to keep the operation running smooth.

To enter the 72 hole stroke play event players need have a index of 9.4 or less, be one of the approximately 41 exempt players or qualify at one of the 9 qualifying tournaments. Players must qualify in the district of their home course unless pro-

viding a good reason why they cannot do so. 180 players make the field with a cut after 36 holes to allow the top 70 players and ties to play for the championship.

Four days of championship play will provide for the true state champion and winner of the Sinnissippi Cup. The cup received its name from the first championship in 1901 when the amateur was played at Sinnissippi Country Club which is now the Janesville Country Club. While players compete for individual honors WSGA member clubs with three qualifiers compete for the Yule Cup awarded to the low club after the first 36 holes of play.

Past winners of the State Amateur include US Open Winner Andy North, and



PGA Tour Players Steve Stricker, JP Hayes and Mark Wilson.

In 2011 at Maple Bluff Country Club Mike McDonald shot a final round 72 to finish with a 1 over total of 285. McDonald finished one stroke ahead of Whitefish Bay's Jack Schultz and Green Bay's Ricky Hearden. The 24 year old McDonald only took his driver out of the bag twice in the final round to stay in the narrow Maple Bluff fairways. The Germantown native played golf for Marquette College.

Kregel grew up in Beecher, IL a small community just south of Chicago. Matt started working at Shady Lawn Golf Course (Now called Cardinal Creek) as a cart boy after 8th grade. He got to know the Superintendent and by the time he was 16 he joined the grounds crew and never left the golf industry.

Matt began at Illinois State university as a business major and found a job working part time at the ISU golf course under Steve Leason. It only took two years of business classes for Kregel to realize he did not want to work indoors and his love of the golf course led him to change paths. ISU did not offer a turf program so Matt transferred to the University of Illinois and

Congratulations to Hornungs Golf Products of Fond du Lac for celebrating their 75th year in business. Hornungs is the "Walmart" of golf course and golf shop supliers offering everything from pencils to shirts to tee and green equipment.

Clarence and Sue Hornung started the business out of their home in 1936. The business has since grown to a 50,000 square foot facility serving over 12,000 golf retailers around the world.

According to an article in April 2012 issue of *Golf Business* magazine some courses have found themselves in hot water with the United States Department of Labor for trading golf for golf course marshal services.

The quid pro pro agreement breaches the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA). Operators of The Golf Club at Fleming island in Jacksonville, FL found out the hard way when they were forced to pay over \$73,000 in back pay to 19 workers last year. It is suggested the labor department is not targeting golf courses but in the Florida case a employee/volunteer complained when he was not allowed the tee time he wanted.

So although inspection is unlikely any course is only one complaint away from fines and back pay.
