Hello to all WGCSA members, as 2012 quickly comes to an end the WGCSA Board of Directors has been busy planning for next season. As a board, we met on October 20th and had a productive meeting as we reviewed the 2012 season of events and discussed various options and ideas to make the WGCSA stronger and more efficient in 2013.

The present WGCSA board under the leadership of Mr. Jeff Millies CGCS was able to have another successful year of events, education, and networking. Thanks to the generous support of the Affiliate Companies participating in our Industry Partnership Program we have again been able to offer free attendance at the GIS WI Hospitality Room (our single largest expense), funding of the Grass Roots Magazine, and help with funding our monthly meetings, website, and members handbook. We simply cannot thank the Industry Partners enough for the dedication to our membership and association for all they do.

With the strong support and financial security of the WGCSA we are happy to report that as we enter our 83rd year as an association we can hold the line on industry partnership fees as well as membership dues for all members. It has been several years since we have had a dues increase and we are happy to report that in these tough economic times we can continue to offer the same services and events as always without increasing your dues. As a board we have reviewed our services and offerings and have made some changes to help with efficiency. I want to take a moment to announce these changes in procedure so you are all aware of how they impact you.

Our first change is that although we have determined we do not need to raise dues, we must address the ongoing situation of late payment of many members' dues payments. In the spirit of making sure as many members as possible renew dues by the February 1st deadline, the WGCSA board has approved that all

members who renew dues by returning the renewal form and payment via mail or renewing online via PayPal with credit card, will receive a complimentary gift as an incentive. Likewise those members who fail to meet the February 1st deadline will then have an additional 30 day grace period to renew but they will not be eligible for the complimentary gift. Any members who do not renew by April 1st will be subject to a \$25.00 late fee in addition to the dues payment. Obviously we want all members to renew on time as it is truly beneficial for both the members and the association.

We will have more information on this new change at the Fall Business Meeting which begins at 11 AM on December 4th prior to the Symposium in Kohler, WI

The other important change to make members aware of is that we will no longer be using regular mail to announce our monthly and business meetings. We have determined that our members can get this information electronically (email) efficiently and since all monthly meetings and notices are easily found on the Home Page and Calendar on our website. We have offered this option for several years. The majority of our members already are opting for email notification for monthly meetings so this does not affect the vast majority in any way. Please understand that the mailing of the Dues Renewal Forms, ALL editions of the Grass Roots, and the annual Members Handbook/Directory will continue to be mailed conventionally like they always

have. The change to electronic delivery pertains to meeting notices only. In addition you will still be able to download and print off the hard copy of meeting notices from either the emails themselves OR by going the Home Page of the WGCSA website. These hardcopies can still be mailed into the WGCSA office as in the past if any members prefer registering and paying this way.

We want to be proactive in our communication of these changes, and trust that you will be appreciative of the fact that the WGCSA leadership is doing all we can to make the association beneficial to each and every member as we can. ### Foot Golf

What a year it has been for Wisconsin golf! The year started with a bang, the temperature heated up and the rain was spotty at best. Records temperatures were seen everywhere. With all the happenings in golf like the Women's Open at Kohler there was a huge first happening in the Wisconsin Dells. On July 22nd the first US Foot Golf Championship was played. Foot Golf has been alive and growing in Europe and had it's first ever event at Chula Vista Resort. What is foot golf you ask well let me explain it to you.

Foot Golf is played on a regulation golf course and the player uses a number size 5 soccer ball. Play is from the forward tees and you play to specialized cups at the end of each hole. The cups for this event where 21inch flower pots with a regulation putting green cup cut into the bottom to hold the flag. These cups where not placed in the

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putting greens but near the green usually in the rough, allowing organizers to incorporate trees and bunkers into the course. The players and organizers understand the traditions of our game and are very understanding. The players wore turf shoes and not soccer boots, so they did little or no damage to the course. They also dressed in more traditional golf attire and like many of our league players they rode in golf cars, more on that later.

This new form of golf blended well with the more traditional game. The day of the tournament they were able to have regular play before and after the event with little or no effort.

The players were able to complete 18 holes in around  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hours. On the day of the Tournament they closed the first tee and  $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours after the last tee time the tournament kicked off. The first players easily caught the traditional golfers before they could finish.

Many of the participants rode in golf cars and when asked why the answer was very simple, "we need to have the golf car so we have someplace to carry our beer." OK so these guys are very much like our normal players. When asked about the lack of clubs each player said they play with between 10 and 12 clubs or 5 to 6 different ways to strike the ball with each foot.

When interviewing Bill Kehoos the Superintendent at Chula Vista he made the following observation. A certain person felt they should cut the cups on the putting green but Bill was able to convince them that this was not possible and the repair would be very difficult. Bill rode with the organizer and set-up the course, marking each hole and assessing the difficulty of each pin placement. Once the pin locations were located it took 2 workers 4 full days to set cups.

Each hole had to be hand dug and the material hauled away, then the cup set and leveled with a sand base with a regulation cup in the bottom of the 21 inch flower pot. When these holes are not being used they are covered with a <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> piece of plywood painted green, to allow regular play to continue and not become a hazard to golf balls or ill driven golf cars.

As far a golf course set-up Bill was done. As we talked he pointed out that the players did virtually no damage, limited divots, no pitch marks on greens, divot bottles were not needed, putting area height way over 0.11" and no disease control was requested. He also made a point to say that these players can complete 9 holes in just over an hour and that this might be a great way to bring revenue to Chula Vista in the fall. As we all know leagues end late August to early September many times due to lack of daylight to complete 9 holes. These foot golfers can play much later into the year.

Now to the golf, this event had players from all over the USA and Europe. The course that they played at Chula Vista was 4230 yards with a par of 69. The winning player made it around that course in 80. At the conclusion of the event Bill Kehoss was recognized as the first Foot Golf Superintendent in the United States.

The course at Chula Vista remains set-up and ready for future play. I was informed that the Foot Golf League of America is in the process of trying to setup more event and leagues throughout the US. Chula Vista is presently setting up a league and this writer and his sons can't wait to give it a try.
