Thursday afternoon will feature Dr. Jim Crum from Michigan State University. He will discuss various topics on identification and diagnosis on putting greens and the current concerns and issues of topdressing materials on putting greens.

The other sessions relating to the Allied associations are interesting enough to cover a lot of our industry needs as well, such as Sharon Lilly and Dr. John Ball discussing design and marketing of tree management programs for golf courses. Minnesota Oak Wilt Update (Session III on Thursday). New insights for the use of mulches around trees are other typical subjects. Gary Custer, certified professional agronomist with PBI Gordon, will give two talks on the timely subject of biostimulant research and application. Also, Dr. Graves from Iowa State University will address drought stress problems in trees.

All in all, this year's Conference and Show promises to meet the needs for all of us professionals in this great industry which we are privileged to be a part of. All of you will be getting a complete program in the mail later this month.



Communications

President's Report

Keith Scott, CGCS, and Jerry Murphy, CGCS, will be our delegates. MTGF is willing to give money but it can't be a rebate program. Donations to scholarship or research are acceptable. The MTGF could sponsor a speaker at the March Mini-Seminar for possibly \$3,000 to \$5,000. This should be written into the MTGF Bylaws. Last year's donation could have been \$3,500. MTGF discussion. Discussion on the MGCSA starting its own trade show. Nicol makes a motion to have Scott Turtinen write a letter to the MTGF for \$17,000 annually to start a public relations program to benefit the MTGF and the MGCSA. The MGCSA Executive Committee would administer this program.

Did You Know....

Did you know that you can save time by viewing all the replies to a posting on the forums with only one click of your mouse? To take advantage of this feature, simply open up the first posting of the thread. Underneath the "Responses" heading, you'll see a link that says "View All Replies." Click on it and you'll get the entire thread on a single page (and you can print it out for your files, too).

Technology Update

Optimizing your Internet browser can make your surfing adventure much more efficient. Both Internet Explorer and Netscape Navigator store copies of the web pages you visit on your computer. Depending on your browser, these are referred to as "temporary Internet files" or "cache." Having these pages stored in your memory speeds up the downloading process on your next visit. However, if you don't periodically clean them out, they can slow down your system and prevent you from viewing the most current material on a website.

Internet Explorer users should start by going to the "view" menu and selecting the "Internet options" tab. In this area, you'll find the option to delete your temporary Internet files. Netscape users should go to the "options" menu and then select "network preferences." Next, go to the "cache" tab, where you will find the options to "clear memory cache" and 'clear disk cache." If you perform both these functions, it will clear all the temporary files in the cache.

Great Links: All About MapQuest

MapQuest is a popular interactive service that allows users to find specific locations, obtain driving directions, and create and save personalized maps. In fact, you may have already seen MapQuest on the sites of other well-known organizations, such as the National Geographic Society, AAA, Reader's Digest and numerous yellow page directories. GCSAA will be linking to MapQuest's site from the education section to help members find regional seminar venues. Armed with the location information from your confirmation letter, you'll be able to get driving directions from your home or course to your seminar, print a map and choose your own route. The MapQuest site also features a good FAQ section, details about mapping, instructions for using My MapQuest to create personalized maps and special tips for AOL users.


Free Remodeling Brochure Available From Society Of Golf Course Architects


